GREEK and CRETAN BATTLE COMMEMORATION WEEK.

Friday night 18th May, saw the commencement of the Commemoration celebrations in the form of a Greek Medal presentation night, when some twenty Greek Medals were presented to 6th Div members, amongst them being Frank Sadler (Dubbo) Brian Hill (Blayney) Jack Hine (Lithgow) Phil Smith, Norm Auberson, Jack Mann's widow and Porky Whalans niece. Sir Ivan Dougherty made a presentation to the Cretan Association of an oil painting on behalf of Dr. Tom Selby, former M.O. of the 2/2nd Battalion, whose work for others is well known, especially in New Guinea. Saturday afternoon 19th May, a march down Pitt St. to the Cenotaph, led by the Parramatta Lancers Band opened proceedings, followed by a service and a wreath laying ceremony. After the end of the service, all those who were invited, adjourned to the Greek Consul-General's offices in Pitt St. for drinks and the usual savouries. RETURN of the 4th INFANTRY BATTALION 1st A.I.F. BANNER.

To those members who marched in the early morning wreath-laying parade on Anzac Day, 1984 and watched the old 4th banner and its bearers join us at Barrack St., also to all members no matter where: We think there is quite a story to tell about the old banner, which must be told, because up till the weekend before 'nzac Day, we did not have the old banner or know where it was. one two weeks before Anzac Day your Editor phoned Cliff Horsley of the Assn. of 4th Infantry Battalions to find out if the old 4th Battalion would be coming to the usual wreath laying ceremony with its banner. If not then the 2/4th would carry it out in front, to show that the parent body was incorporated in the ceremony as well.

You can imagine my surprise when Cliff told me there was no banner and further he did not think it would be in existence any more. Cliff told me that when the Merrylands Drill Hall (C Coy 4RNSWR H.Q) was broken into by thieves some 10 months ago, besides stealing rifles etc., they also took a lot of memorabillia, including the old 4th banner, which was in custody there. Naturally I thought that's the last we have seen of the banner. No thief would be bothered with an old banner. It had no monetary value and whoever took it would not think of the sentimental or traditional value that it held for members of our 4th Battalion Associations. So I gave up hope of ever seeing it again. I did not bargain on human nature and the way it can re-act at times.

On the Monday before Anzac Day, I phoned the Secretary of Assn. of 4 Battalions Lt-Col. Vin Hallinan, to extend an invitation to our Anzac Luncheon. In the course of the conversation we made mention of the 4th Bn. banner. To my surprise and wonderment, he told me that it had been returned and that it would take pride of place at the wreath laying ceremony. 86 year old George Rebot, of the 4th Bn. 1st A.I.F. would march with it accompanied by two young soldiers of the 4th Bn. RNSWR. I went to bed that night knowing our plans for Anzac Day were complete nothing could spoil the day for us and so it proved to be.

On Friday, 5th April, our Patron, Major-General Sir Ivan Dougherty, was invited to perform a very unusual rite - the unveiling of the re-sited Wentworth Falls War Memorial. The Memorial has been re-sited in Coronation Park, Wentworth Falls. This is the report as printed in the Wentworth Falls local paper and forwarded by our man on the spot - Ron Barber to Slim Powers.
"After 63 years, the fallen heroes of Wentworth Falls have been re-honoured and their names will soon be emblazoned up in lights. Major-GeneralSir Ivan Dougherty last week (April 5th) unveiled the Wentworth Falls Cenotaph, which was movev recently to Coronation Park. At the ceremony Sir Ivan Dougherty spoke the following:- 'The men we are remembering to-day were not much older than the young people gathered here this afternoon. That is the great tragedy of war. And you young people must stop war from coming to your country.... When I think of the fighting men, they were magnificent. When I think of the Lives that were lost, that was tragic! After the unveiling, the City Mayor, Mr Peter Quirk said the Memorial would soon be floodlit. One lady attending the unveiling had the special experience of seeing the cenotaph unveiled twice. Mrs Jessie Pearce of Wentworth Falls also attended the 1921 unveiling by the then N.S.W. Govenor, Sir Walter Davies." (Ron Barber - Courtesy'Blue Mtns Echo)

We learn from the December, 1983 issue that a Victoria Barracks Corps of Guides has been formed and it is fulfilling an important role every Tuesday morning conducting groups of visitors on a guided walking tour of the barracks. This tour follows the weekly guard changing ceremony which ends at 11am. It cocludes with a visit to the Army Museum in the old Military Gaol in the South-East corner of the Barracks. During the tour, the public are made aware of the history of each of the original buildings, where the building materials came from, who occupied them in 1848 and their present day usage. Hence the need for guides to conduct these tours.

The Corps of Guides was formed on the suggestion of the Commander, 2nd Military District, Brigadier J. Hooper. It comprises retired Regular Army, Army Reserve

and demobilised 2nd A.I.F. personnel.

Previously the task of enducting walking tours was carried out by Regular Army Warrant Officers, Sergeants and Corporals who were required to leave their regular duties for at least an hour to guide visitors. The ranks of the Corps members, previously or presently held, range from Colnel down to Gunner, Signalman and Private. However there is a predominence of former Regular Army Warrant Office: Further recruits to the Corps are sought, to lighten the load on present members. So if you can help on Tuesdays and on Sundays (even if not on a regular basis) would you please phone Lt-Col Ron Thirwell at the Barracks.
