4th Battalion - Royal N.S.W. Regiment- Exercising the Right of Freedom of Wollongong.

Just recently, the above battalion exercised it's right to march through the City of Wollongong. This ceremonial exercise took place on 3rd November and was a part of the

150th Anniversary celebrations of the city.

The Freedom of the City of Wollongong was bestowed on the 4RNSWR by the Lord Mayor of the City of Wollongong on 27th September, 1980 together with the ship's company of Her Majesty's Australian Ship Orion. It was only the second occasion on which the City of Wollongong has conferred this honour on a Regiment of the Australian Military Forces, the privilege previously being conferred on the 34th Infantry

Battalion (The Illawara Regiment), on 8th March, 1959.
The granting of the Freedom of Entry to the City of Wollongong in the twentieth centu is a graceful gesture by the City, affording an opportunity to place on record an appreciative reference to a fighting unit of the Army and a recognition of the bond which exists between the Battalion and the City. It's bestowal is considered also as a tribute to the citizens of Wollongong and its environs who served with the Regiment, both in war and peace. To have such an honour conferred is considered a ognition of the Battalion's high standing with the community and an honour of the highest magnitude.

The ceremonial of the "Freedom of the City" is the conferring of the title and the distinction of marching through the streets of a city on ceremonial occasions with "drawn swords, bayonets fixed, drums beating, bands playing and the colours of the Regiment flying." It is one of the most interesting of military traditions of the past. For the benefit of those members who are not familiar with this ceremony

we print a resume of the ritual.

The Chief Inspector of Police issues the challenge, on the approach of the Battalion:

"Halt! Who goes there?"

The Commanding Officer replies, "The 4th Battalion Royal New South Wales Regiment exercising its right and privilege to pass through the City of Wollongong with swords drawn, bayonets fixed, drums beating, band playing and colours flying."
The Chief Inspector replies, "I acknowledge your right and privilege. Pas the 4th Battalion, Royal New South Wales Regiment with the Lord Mayor's and Council's Authority."

The Battalion then marches through the City and salutes the Lord Mayor and the Military Commander of the area. As the Battalion passes the saluting-base, guests

and others are requested to stand and salute or uncover, in return.



A GRAND OLD LADY OF YESTERYEAR.

A piece of nostalgia that I am sure will interest members and readers alike was passed on to me by Jim Graham some months ago with the promise to him that it would be printed when space became available, so here it is:-

She reminded me of my schooldays and of a poem, "She was old and feeble and grey...." when I first saw her standing in an obscure corner of the Medical Day Centre at the War Vets Home at Narrabeen. There was a sadness and resign Day Centre at the War Vets Home at Narrabeen. There was a sadness and resign ation that held my interest and sympathy, for at last she had found refuge from the world. As I watched, she seemed to shrink further into herself, but then I noticed a little sparkle of pride was reflected in that sad tired fac and it was as if there was a faint lift of the shoulders and as I continued to watch, I thought I heard a whisper..... "I was not always like this, Oh no! Once there was polish and shine about me. There was laughter and gaiety. My music rang around the world. I have sailed the oceans. Men have flocked to my side. I have brought pleasure to many, been the toast of the bravest and fairest in the land. Oh yes! I have had my triumphs. And now...?"

The life seemed to go out of her once more. I shook my head and straightened my glasses. This once high-ranking "lady" was a "Strad" Grand Piano, her keys, strings and sounding board no longer responsive to hands which perhaps still try to revive memories of Tipperary and Madamosielle from Armentiers. Attachedto the inside of one panel was a faded, aged and yellow typed history, as follows:history, as follows:-

'This piano was presented by Marcus Clarke & Co Ltd in Merch 1915. It gave good service at the Liverpool camp for 3 months, was put on Troopship CERAMI and used by different units of the 3000 troops on that vessel. It was carried from deck to deck for playing hymns on Sundays and for concerts every der in the week. It was landed at Alexandria and for a year saw service in Egypt. In the quiet districts of the Oasis it 'did its bit' as a musical instrument and when the troops in Zeitaem moved to Tell-el-Kebir the piano went with them. From Tell-el-Kebir it travelled to the Canal front. At Serapeum and Hileeta it still gave its music, sometimes on Saturday nights receiving its baptism of beer and candlegrease, but on Sunday it was ready to lead the hymns for the Church Parades out in the desert. From Egypt in 1916, it travelled across the Mediterranean amid the dangers of the Hun submarines.
