Allen during his recent visit to Wagga, This re-union will be worth attending as a very interesting progrm has been arranged, including a bus trip to part of the Snowy River complex on Monday. We make a special plea to all our Victorian and South Australian members to attend this re-union and take the opportunity to meet the NSW members. It is not all that far from Melbourne and Adelaide to Wagga and the roads are good, there is a local airport with services to all capital cities and there may even be train services from Sydney and Melbourne and intermediate stations.

PROPOSED WEST AUSTRALIAN COACH TOUR 1986. A proposal for a coach tour from Newcastle - Sydney - Wagga - Melbourne - Adelaide - Perth; (via Esperance and Albany) returning through Kalgoolie - Port Augusta -Broken Hill (via Wilpeena Pound) - Wagga - Sydney - Newcastle, has been put forward by President Alf Carpenter. The committee discussed the matter and decided to recommend it to the members as a very feasible and viable project. It is proposed to commence on 9th March, 1986 from Newcastle/Sydney and return Sydney/Newcastle on Monday 31st March, 1986. being twenty-three days inclusive. Estimated cost at to-days prices = \$1235 per head. All accommodation will be motel-type (twin-share). Cost will include:- Transport, sight-seeing tours(where applicable), dinner, bed and Breakfast. Free days in Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth. Afternoon and morning tea breaks will be at the discretion of the coach captains. It is planned to have Eski's and tea-making facilities aboard. The coach firm requires a firm guarantee of a full capacity coach of 44 people, we are hoping for two coaches in convoy, however if the full complement of 88 is not achieved the first coach will be filled on a "first come, first served" basis. It is hoped that the V.Ps in Melbourne and Adelaide will give their support to this project and organize a "Country Re-union" style dinner and evening in their respective cities during the tour's visit. The whole idea behind the tour is to meet with our fellow members in these states, who otherwise cannot travel to N.S.W. each year to attend Anzac Day and/or Country Re-unions. If the reception of the project by the members at the Annual General Meeting is favourable a trust account will be opned into which deposits for the trip, of \$120 per person, willbe paid. Subsequent regular payments could be made by the participants prior to March 1986 to alleviate a large lump sum payment prior to departure(if you so desire). We ask members to give this proposal serious before the Annual General meeting, because if it is approved the account will be open for deposits
