# Wreath-laying Ceremony 1985.

Some twenty-seven members, plus some of the ladies, turned out to attend the 41st year of the wreath-laying ceremony of the Association. The march was led, as usual, by that particular group of men, who have become such an integral part of our Association - the Parramatta Caledonian Pipe Band; resplendent as ever. Sir Ivan Dougherty, our Patron and former Commanding Officer, along with President Alf Carpenter, led the marchers to the Cenotaph, where they laid the wreath, which was in the form of a floral 2/4th Infantry Battalion Colour Patch; in memory of those who fell in battle and those who have departed since the war ended. In front of the Battalion, and in keeping with tradition, the flag of the old 4th Aust. Infantry Battalion, 1914-18, was carried by a young soldier from the Support Company of the 4th Battalion, Royal NSW Regiment. He was accompanied by a member of that great unit - George Ribot, who is well over eighty years of age. To me this ceremony, our very own, is a most solemn one and should be better attended. I know it is most difficult for us to make the effort as we are not getting any younger, however I think that we who live in the Metropolitan Area should show ar example. When you see Sir Ivan and members from as far afield as Lismore, Young, Wagga, etc, attending it makes you wonder if we are becoming a little apathetic.

The Main March Anzac Day 1985.

After a lengthy wait and many an anxious moment, weatherwise, our unit moved off to the stirring music of the Pipes and Drums of the Parramatta Caledonian Pipe Band. One hundred and six members reported on parade, which was a very satisfactory attendance considering the uncertain state of the weather. Our Banner Party, which consisted of 8 troops from Support Company 4RNSWR, turned out in true Parade Ground manner. These young soldiers of the Citizen Forces must be complimented on their dress, bearing and especially their marching. Shades of you and I yesteryear.

We were led by President Alf Carpenter, flanked by Senior Vice-President Allen Lindsay and Past President Ted Fox. Marshal for the wreath-laying ceremony and the main march was John Hawkins. As the 2/4th moved down George Street past Lowes' and opposite the Queen Victoria Building, President Alf gave the command "Eyes Left!" thus saluting that fine body of women folk who belong to the members of the Association, the wives, the relatives, the widows of departed members, and these days, the daughters and lady friends of the sons. To give members a true picture of the march, I quote a stranger to the Association, but a friend of my wife:- "The 2/4th Battalion marched with an erect and straight bearing, especially those in the forefront. Looking tall and broad of shoulder, heads held high, knowing that they had served their country well." What a compliment!

The Dinner at the Gallipoli Memorial Club.
The Annual dinner was held, as usual, at the above-mentioned Club and attended by 125 members and our guests. The guest-list included Major-General Gordon Maitland, Lt-Col. Graham Fleaton CO of 4RNSWR and the Colour Party (mentioned above). There was quite a sprinkling of country members, coming from Lismore, wagga, Temora, Young, Nowra, Blue Mountains, Central Coast and Newcastle Districts. From interstate we had Jack Lyons and Doug Christian of Victoria, Bruce Cork of Queensland and Graham Woodward all the way from England. Apologies were received from John Copland, Allan Kirk, Les Adams, Arthur webb, Morrie Porter, Len Smith, Noel Ford, John Hyles, Roy Findlay, 'Bully' Hayes, Gordon Chrisp and Frank Gattenhoff. If I have missed any names I apologize, it was not intentional. President Alf formally opened the April meeting and called on Secretary Fred Staggs to read the Names appearing in our 'Last Post' column during the last twelve months. Two minutes silence was then observed after which John meehan recited 'The Ode.' Secretary Fred Staggs, seconded by John Ringrose, proposed that the April meeting be closed. Carried.

After the proposition of the Loyal Toast President Alf welcomed our guests, visitor and "long time - no see" members.

Senior Vice-President Allen Lindsay proposed the toast to our guests, using as his theme in his speech the influence of the citizen-soldier, who has been the backbone of the Army, in general, and of our battalion, from past to present, in particular. Major-General Gordon Maitland responded, his interesting speech being received with acclamation.

Lt.-Col. Graham Fleaton then proposed the toast to the Battalion to which Presi. Alf suitably responded. At this stage Sir Ivan made his entry to the dinner and after taking some well-deserved nourishment made the presentation of Honorary Life Membership of the Association to 'Dagwood' Jackson, who, though a little overcome at first, managed to complete his response in true 'Dagwood' fashion. Senior Vice-President Allen then presented Sir Ivan with a copy of the battalion war history- "White over Green" to be presented, in turn, by Sir Ivan to the appropriate authorities in Israel during his forthcoming visit to that country. Sir Ivan is visiting Israel, Greece, Crete and Turkey at the request and as representative of, the RSL during the Israeli celebrations of the defeat of Nazi Germany. forty years ago. At the conclusion of this presentation President Alf thanked Secretary-Manager Harry Gjedsted and all the members of the staff of the Gallipoli Memorial Club for the use of the club during the year and for the cheerful and courteous attention our members always received from them. President Alf then declared the formalities completed and the members got down to the real business of the day, convivial comradeship and "remember whens". The ladies joined us later in the afternoon and the reunion was still in full swing when your Editor departed at approx 1730 hours.
