A WORD FROM THE WISE.

At the 6th Div. Re-union in the course of conversation, Lt-Col(Dr)Selby suggested to Ken Kesteven, that he advise 2/4th members to write out a record of their war service, particularly from the medical point of view and leave with their families. As he could not stay after the committee meeting, Ken reported this to the committee. Some members may recall that some time back, the late Dick Latimer, when a committeemen did some work along these lines. Your writer for one, submitted his record. This necessity increases in importance proportinately and in direct ratio to the Repet's and Government's hardening attitude to new applications for pensions. As our Pensions Officer, John Hawkins pointed out, the Freedom of Imformation act gives ex-servicemen access to their medical records but the contents are only things that have been officially recorded. ed Fox mentioned a back injury, unreported at the time but attested to on oath by witnesses. Similarly, Cec Chrystal had his foot by a truck in Greece and due to the exigencies at the time there was no Sick Parade for this one either and as wellas other things, this injury has come against Cec in his later years.

With this issue of "WOG" we enter a new era: a new routine of publication and distribution every two months instead of monthly, which it has enjoyed for the last 40 years.

For some of our members, especially those in distant parts of Australia, and overseas, this may be disappointing. They will miss that regular flow of information about the Association and its members which they have enjoyed at very regular intervals for so long.

But this change will have one redeeming factor. "WOG" will continue for as long as our Editor, Laurie Waterhouse, or other dedicated members, remain willing to carry on with its publication. Had Laurie's motion for this change to bi-monthly been rejected at our recent Annual General Meeting, the future of "WOG" would have been much less assured.

As one of the originators of WOG, away back in 1946, one feels conscious of having started something which seemed a good idea at that time, and then having "gone bush" thus leaving others in our fledgling Association "holding the baby". This situation was not, of course, anticipated, or really within one's power to rectify.

Thanks to the efforts of many dedicated members, right up to the present team, led by Laurie Waterhouse, the aspirations of those early editors have been richly fulfilled. The strength of our Battalian Association, maintained so long after its formation, is probably unique in Australia. The enthusiasm with which members take part in Re-unions, Anzac Day, Association of 4th Battalian and other functions, can be attributed largely to the good lines of communication which have been maintained through "WOG".

For those who may feel to some extent deprived by this change to bi-monthly it may be said that down the years - the whole 40 of them - we have enjoyed 480 issues of "WOG". A mighty fine effort, and a very fair "crack of the whip" for all at the receiving end.

For many good reasons, which were vigorously debated at the A.G.M., this decision was firmly taken. In doing so, we were facing the "facts of life" and being, therefore, realistic in the interests of the future of "WOG".

There were those who felt that a "referendum" should have been taken among all members of our Association. This would have involved much paper work (and quite some cost) to no great advantage. Considering the very limited response which we had to the airing of this matter in WOG as far back as November, 1985, it seems unlikely that we would have arrived at any better concensus than that which was reached at the Annual General Meeting in February.

There are ways by which we can be compensated for this lesser frequency of "WOG". Editor Laurie assures us that where necessary and practicable within his production programme, another sheet, containing up to two pages of text, could be added to "WOG" from time to time without upsetting postage costs or regulations.

Further, should there be something very important to be notified in between the normal two monthly issue, a "special edition" of WOG comprising up to one or even two pages could be sent out, if considered desirable by the Association Executive.

There can be little doubt that this bi-monthly issue will prove a wise decision. Let us continue to support our Editor by sending him information (preferably in writing) whenever we can. Those living in the metropilitan area who have the time and energy, and would like to help the current production team would, no doubt, be most welcome.

We can only be thankful that we still have members able and willing to carry on this vital link within our Association. Congratulations to all concerned right down the years, and a happy 40th Anniversary of "White over Green", on 15th May, 1986:
