Lunch was had at the Goolwa R.S.L. in the form of a barbecue, with liquid refreshments supplied. This proved to be very enjoyable to all, once again plaques were presented to Peter Denver on behalf of the Goolwa R.S.L. So it was on that spirit of old Ireland, that the coach rolled out of Port Augusta en route for Whyalla and Iron Knob. The theme on the coach that day was Irish jokes and songs but somehow Ross Smith got Scotland involved, of course we all know St Patrick came from Scotland. I don't know where they unearthed the yarns and stories from, but they certainly reeked of the Blarney. Whoever heard of a scotsman playing an Irish flute, referring to Smithy and his tin whistle. Talking of entertainment on the coach, there was no lack of it. First of all, we had Barry (coach driver) with his daily philosophies, Professor Car--penter with his morning lectures on Hypnosis and Physical Fitness etc. Ross Smith and hilarious flute playing, Harry Whitman a very able story spinner, along with Jim Foreman. Then of course we had Dr Wright, that TU character, in the person of Horrie Crossfield (Horrie the Wog Dog) in between all these acts we had "Bo Bo" Bertram, sliding down the aisle of the coach, tending to the parched throats of the various passengers. It was on this St Patricks Day 1986 that the very matured and mellow singing of a group of old rockers, called the "Wogettes" was heard for the first time. Afterwards a stop to have a look at Mount Wudinnia, a miniature Ayres Rock, also to see another rock formation known as Turtle Rock, and then the long run through the big wheat belt down to Ceduna. It had been rather a hot day and everyone was pleased to get to the motel for the night. Once again a very good dinner and a few cans of Swan or Fosters. The Halleys Comet Club did not show the enthusiasm it had the previous night, oh they were up alright, but I think the cloudy skies dampened the willingness somewhat.
