President Alf Carpenter presiding, opened the meeting, welcoming the visitors and the champion swimmer of the River Murray, Ron Maczkowiak of Loxton, South Australia, then calling for one minute silence and reciting the Infantry mans Ode. Business was mainly routine, correspondence dealing with Bn medal applications, also letters from See-Manager of Gallipoli Club, Doug Slinger and the brother of the late country Vice-President Artie Kleem. Letter from the Gallipoli Memorial Club was in reply to a letter of appreciation sent by the Ass to the Board of Directors of the Club in appreciation of the courtesy and priviledges extended by the club to the 2/4th Inf. Bn. Ass. and its members, specially for the use of the new Anzac Room, which is proving ideal for our Monthly meetings. The letter from the late Artie Kleem's brother Jack, was the expression of thanks to the Assoc member for the attendance at the late Artie's funeral and cremation. Daug Slinger wrote his usual long screed to the Secretary, outlining the West Aust Activities and seeking the executives permission to make a presentation to the Preveli Memorial Chapel. Two main items came out of the meeting, on the election of "Dagwood" Jackson of Wagga to the position of Vice President South Western New South Wales. This position became vacant on the death of Artie Kleem, committee recommended "Dagwoods" nomination to the general meeting which voted unaminously for "Dagwood" Jackson to fill the vacancy. 

So to set the record straight, an article was printed in one of the R.S.L. subbranch magazines and here it is here for our readers interest. The statues that stand at either end of the Cenotaph where sculptured and then cast in bronze by Sir Bertram MacKennal, one time great sculptor The statues represent a sailor of the Royal Aust Navy and a soldier from the First A.I.F. of the first World War.

The Sailor. The model for the sailor was No.3059. Leading Signalman John William Varcoe of the R.A.N, a characteristic sailor wearing the rig and equipment for fighting ashore. He was born at Baker's Swamp, N.S.W = on

ly 20th, I897, educated at Dubbo Public School and enlisted in the R.A.

If June 3rd I9I3. He served on H.A.M.S Pioneer, Dec I9I4 to I9I9 and was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal on May I7th I9I8. He also served on H.A.M.S Parramatta I9I7 to I9I9. He died in I948, Aged 5Iyrs.

The Soldier. The model for the soldier, was Regimental No 6, Private William P. Darley, of the I5th Aust. Infantry Battalion and also served with the 4th Field Ambulance. First A.I.F. He died in Brisbane in January, I936, aged 66 years. Sir Bertram MacKennal was impressed by the physique, atheletic bearing and the stern warrior like cut of face, of both men.

Official Side. Inquiries are made from time to time as to which is the official side of the cenotaph. The answer is the side facing the G.P.O. This then dictates the correct dressing of the Flow staffs. Thus on all occasions, when dressed, the Australian Flag is flown on the right hand side (George St end), the Union Jack on the left hand side (Pitt St end).

IT A DREAM.

In the last issue of The P.O.W. ssociations magazine Barbwire and Bamboo' there appeared a paragraph which caught my eye and on reading it, could nt believe at what my eyes read. We wonderwho could have made this profound statement and what influence he has on decisions made on claims we might make for a pension". Unquote. By the way, this appeared in David McNichol's column in The Bulletin', 3rd June 1986 issue. I leave it with the members to dwell on. I know what my thoughts are of the individual and what I would like to do to him.

In the July-August issue the discription of the Perth Coach trip finished at the point where the tourists had arrived at Eucla after a blustery hot day. We take up the discription from Eucle. Who would have thought such comfort existed out on the Nullaber. Here we find ourselves at the Motel at Eucla, with a good room with an air conditioner, het and cold water, a comfortable bed for the night. Then when confronting the bar, we find we can have the pick of Aussie brews, nice and cold too. The dining room was very good and the meals excellent. No roughing it, as we expected when getting to these out of way places. The modern traveller has it made now, providing he does the right thing. Water is the richest commedity out here, as it it so scarce. Imagine the suprise Per and Betty Malla had when they found they had scored a water bed in their room . Is it Imagine the suprise Perc any wonder Perc waking during the night wondered if he was back on the ocean waves again, Imagine the extra thrill you would have, if you were having a little hanky-panky on a water bed. Rumour had it next morning, that someone was seen being dragged home to the roost, but no of any scuffed shoe caps could be seen in the morning. However there were one or two sore heads, so the night spent at Eucla must have been a good one. After a very good breakfast early, we had been up since the chooks started to stir in dawning light. This was because we had a long trek ahead of us, we just had to make it to Esperence by sundown. A distance of some 930 kms for the coach to cover, with the prospect of a very hot day before us. Supprising the number who do, through being too sure After a good nights rest and a good breakfast, it was all aboard the coach for a good drive around the township of Esperence and the Bay of Isles and then out along the Eleven mile beach unto the Pink Lake, It was very murky when we arrived, of course it was a bit cloudy, however within a minute of our arrival the sun began to shine and then we could see the water changing colour to a real pink, of course the cameras went to work at a very brisk rate. It was indeed a real phenonemen and worth the trip out to see it. Found out , that certain indivuals looking the the town over the night before found a good hotel, which had Topless' Barmaids. The Arabs wrecked it in the '60s during the war withthe JEWS AND THE BRITISH FRENCH FORCES. Prime Minister Menzies had it ressurected, repaired and resited

At the lookout at ALBANY, afitting place for it, because Albany was the last look at the Australian landscape as the convoys sailed for Gallipoli in 1915. There were 90 to 100 ships in the harbour at one specific time in 1915. A great and lovely harbour and one can get a good view of it from the War Memorial lookout. Another highlight of the town is the big rock in the main street, it is shaped like the head and shoulders of a dog, hence its name 'The Dog Rock'. In the morning, it was an early start again, so that we could fit in some sight seeing on the way to Perth. So after a good breakfast we set of to pass through some lovely country and when we reached the town of Denmark, this more or less signified that we were in the country of the giant trees and the rich pasture country. It was decided to have a combined late morning tea and an early lunch to save a little more time. So that whem wearrived at Pemberton, it was inland to view what is left of the giants- the great Karri tree. They really destroyed these big forests of Karri, that there are not many left, what is left of them they are trying to preserve them for posterity sake. It was interesting to see the big trees but not so the havor man in his greed has caused to After leaving Pemberton , we talked Barry to deviate his route so that he would stop at the coastal township of Busslton, because it was Friday and the 13th day out from Sydney, natually the wallets where getting a little light on, after all they had taken a battering on the way. Barry saw the wisdom in our thinking and it was on 3pm when he pulled up right outside the Westpac bank and after recieving very good service from the girls in the bamk and a good wish to enjoy our stay in Perth, it was back in the coach so that Barry could show us some of the scenic spots of this lovely seaside resort. The Yankee sailors flock down here when they pull into Perth for recreational leave. Certainly have a lovely long beach, which a big attraction and the two kilometre long pier, a boon to the the fisherman. If you wanted a very quiet and restful holiday, then Busselton is the ideal spot for it. Leaving Busselton, we made for Bunberry where the freeway starts, so it was'nt long before we passed through Mandurah and Rockingham. Passing the industrial complex Kwinanna and skirting the outer limits of Freemantle on our left, we were soon on the Canning Freeway that takes you into South Perth.
