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VIETNAM VETERANS! NATIONAL RE-UNION:-It was a beautiful day in Sydney, sunshine and a clear blue sky. It was also a day of cheers and tears, nobody - Marchers or Spectators - tried to hide their emotions. It was a day that no Viet. Vet. will ever forget. We lined both sides of George Street, in the vicinity of the Town Hall, and we allowed ourselves a few tears as those younger men paraded past us with a newly-acquired pride reflected in their demeanour. S.V.P.Allen Lindsay called us "to order", a special mark of respect for the members of 4 Bn.R.A.R. when that Unit approached us, & with our 2/4 8n.colours displayed, per medium of our Unit Flag, we stood to attention until that battalion had marched on. We were especially proud to see "Larry" and Yvonne Dooley's son "on parade" with his Viet. Vet. mates. Several of us were approached individually, after the March, and were thanked "for turning out to welcome us"by Viet. Vets. (some with tears in their eyes) who obviously did appreciate our presence. The event has been well reported in Sydney newspapers but, for the benefit of our Interstate Members, the following extracts do seem to sum up what their belated reception meant for these "forgotten" men: "The Vietnam Veterans'Welcome Home Parade was one of the greatest emotional outpourings Sydney has witnessed in decades and thousands of personal ghosts were laid to rest".

"Some of the 25,000 men wept openly as the March progressed past a cheering, flag-waving crowd of 150,000 who lined the city streets".

"Women and young girls rushed up to Veterans in wheelchairs, kissing them and handing them flowers".

"This was an emotional purging of anger, frustration, bitterness, confusion and rejection which has possessed these men since they returned from that terrible Asian war". "For years I walked the streets being ashamed of who I was. Not any more. Not after today".

Normie Rowe, veteran of Vietnam and the "pop" stage, said: "The March surpassed all hopes. I heard of a bloke who went home last night for the first time in 20 years. He just turned up on his daughter's doorstep. Another bloke came out of the jungle near Townsville where he has been living since he got back

from 'Nam. He marched today".

EDITORIAL - ARE WE LOSING OUR IDENTITY?:-There are moves to change our flag. There are people in high places advocating that we should become a Republic. We have an immigration policy which by the year 2020 is estimated to reveal that Australia's Asian-born population will have nearly trebled to 6 per cent,or more than 1.2 million, compared with only 5.5 per cent British or Irish-born. Ex-N.S.W.Premier Wran's advocacy of a Republic was greeted enthusiastically by Sydney migrant groups who stated that "Australia should be regarded as a separate entity". Ethnic groups, as reported in Sydney newspapers. have said that many migrants are already refusing to swear allegiance to the Queen at citizenship ceremonies. Nino Randozzo, editor of Australia's largest Italian newspaper, Il Globo, said:"The ties to the British crown

are totally meaningless to most European migrants."

So, are we losing our identity? I believe we are, and will continue to do so unless our migrant intake is modified to protect OUR ethnic origins. I do not suggest that we ought to revert to a "white Australia" policy but I would be reassured to some extent if those who shape our immigration policy, in respect of the racial "mix", would at least consider the opinion expressed by an early politition who feared that Asiatic immigrants would lower the Australian standard of living and who said:"It is not the bad qualities but the good qualities of these alien races that make them dangerous to us; it is their inexhaustible energy, their power of applying themselves to new tasks, their endurance, their low standard of living that makes them NOTE for scholars: The "trivia" above-mention- such competitors. The result of contact would be not to lift them up to our standard but to drag our labouring population down to theirs. But the national factor should be considered. We are here touching the profoundest instinct of the individual or nation, the instinct of self-preservation; for it is nothing less than the national manhood, the national character and the national future that are at stake ... all Australian-born have an obligation to pass on to their children their territory undiminished and uninvaded ... It is the note of nationality which gives dignity and importance to this debate. For the unity of Australia is nothing if that does not imply a united race". They are the words of Alfred Deakin, spoken sometime about 1907 - maybe modern circumstances dictate that his views should be varied, but there remains much in them that still valid today. is

Instability in our region is placing increasing pressure on Australia to accept more and more Third World immigrants, and we have a duty to assist. However, an attitude expressed in verse by Dame Mary Gilmore still rings true, i.e. "NATIONALITY" -

"I have grown past hate and bitterness, I see the world as one, Yet, though I can no longer hate, MY son is still MY son.

All men at God's round table sit, And all men must be fed; But this loaf in my hand, This loaf is MY SON'S bread".

Not excuse for a grog

A MESSAGE for the young, yuppies and euchred, Ex-servicemens' reunions may be hard to understand. They are not just an excuse for a grog; they are attended by people with a fond welded out of sharing hard work, hardship and danger.

It is difficult for young people to realise that at several stages during World War II, we were nearly on the losing side; the fight was to prevent Australia becoming a German or a Jap colony.

I find it hard to describe some of the good things that were manifest during Service life. Some have only recently been properly described as unit histories are published.

I don't want to sound as a do-gooder, a conceited prig or a Colonel Blimp, but I can't forget that about 35 years ago. My Iriendly garage man and I were talking and Major-General Bir Ivan Dougherty's name cropped up. "I would have died for that bastard," he said.

The recently published history of an infantry battalion cribes how an Australian soldier escaped from a prisoner of war cage with an-other and promised that he would not leave Crete without him. They got separated but, at great risk of not getting off, he waited for his friend.

The bravery that was illustrated by members of the Sixth Division should not be forgotten. A Mosman doctor, for instance, volunteered to stay back in Crete at a dressing station and became, as he knew he would, a prisoner of war. The nursing sisters behaved similarly.

I served as a doctor and saw many examples of the tenderness of the tough, trained Australian soldier. heard one say during a shell-ing attack, "Is it OK down there?" "Of course," said the other. "I mean, is it OK for the doctor?"

This officer-man relationship naturally was not universal, but it occurred as the mode in forward areas. What a shame it can't be perpetuated in industry today!

Maybe a proper National Service, not just of a military nature, might reintroduce the understanding that discipline does not lower self-esteem.

At reunions the chaps don't spend all the time fighting old battles . . . in fact, quite the reverse. It is a matter of renewing friendships.
