President Alf advised that he had attended a 2/1st.Field Regiment Re-union at Dorrigo and that the Organisers of the Tasmanian Tour had reluctantly informed him of an increase in the cost by \$45.00, the total now being \$1,260.00 per head. The Secretary reported that he has received numerous applications for the Battalion Medal since we publicised the deadline date for availability of same.

The Treasurer reported the following account balances at 27/10/87: General Account \$2,153.00; Benevolent Account \$13,069.00; Total Funds \$15,222.00. The Nelson Bay Reunion was a financial success and the Association will receive a refund of all monies advanced.

The Editor reported on a problem encountered with production of October "W.O.G." when using the new supply of "letterhead" pages for the first time. After continuous "paper feed" stoppages, which caused a part inside the copier to come adrift, the whole issue had to be printed by a commercial photocopying firm after the separate machine owned by The Gallipoli Memorial Club also failed to cope with the problem. Next day the service mechanic revealed that the new letterheads are slightly shorter and narrower than the previous ones and our paperfeed cassettes could not hold them in place firmly, not being adjustable for different paper dimensions, so that misfeeding into the machine was inevitable and consistent. To overcome this situation we are having one cassette modified in its inside measurements and will use it only for the front and reverse pages of the Newsletter. GENERAL BUSINESS:

Jack Partridge reported on progress to date re the 1988 Re-union in Gosford - he already has bookings with deposits for 92 persons.

It revealed glaring deficiencies in our defence strategies and capabilities, including manpower and vehicles, and Major-General Mike Jeffery (Commander of the army's operational 1st.Division) subsequently stated that under existing manpower and logistics strengths (several thousand more men being an urgent need) Australia could defend its northern regions from a foreign invader for a maximum of six weeks.

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TRIVIATA - HOW TO COOK A COCKATOO:-Recipe by Kenneth Venn 8.8.C.
