

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VALE - Leonard Francis GODDWIN:-Len Goodwin died peacefully on 31st.March & was cremated on 2nd.April at Allambe Gardens Crematorium, Nerang, after a Service at The Holy Spirit Anglican Church, Isle-of-Capri (Q'land).

Len was 69 years old at the time of his death and had served with us in Libya, Greece, Rex & Olga Everson, Lionel & June Clarke. Crete, Syria and Darwin. In early 1943, when we SEABREEZE HOTEL: were performing cliff-scaling and associated exercises in the Darwin area,Len and other

VALE -Leonard Francis GOODWIN (Contd.):-2/4 Bn.N.C.O.'s were transferred out and sent to Officer Training Schools. After graduation they were commissioned and posted to other Units, mainly Militia Battalions which lacked battle-experienced Leaders.Len was sent to the 56/53 Infantry Battalion after first serving as an Instructor at the Canungra (Q'land) Jungle-training School. While fighting with 56/53 Bn.on Bouganville Len was awarded the Military Cross for gallantry in an action there during which he was wounded.

Leonard Francis Goodwin was born in 1918 in Yanco, Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area, and at an early age moved with his parents to the Monaro district and then to the new National Capital of Camberra, where his parents took up residence and opened a business. At that period,Len attended school at Telopea Park. Upon leaving school, he secured a position as a hardware salesman with the firm of J.B. Young & Co.(now Grace Bros.). After the war, and back in civilian life, he entered business on his own account in a newsagency which prospered, and subsequently he became involved in Real Estate and Property Development. In 1970, for health reasons, Len migrated to the Queensland Gold Coast and by the time of his death had established himself as a pr inent and successful businessman both in Canberra and on the Gold Coast.

Len also took a great interest in community affairs and, among his many activities, had served as Commodore of the Gold Coast Yacht Club which, by his keen business acumen, he built up to an efficient and "surefire" organisation.

At Len's funeral in Queensland our Association was represented by Jack Hughes and Bruce Cork. There was also a Memorial Service held at the Anglican Church of St.Paul, Manuka, A.C.T., on 14th.April, and it was attended by John and Ruve Falla, Roy Findlay, John May, and Frank Crutchett. Jack Huston and John Hyles were out of town and sent apologies for their inability to be present.

The Rev.John Griffiths, who conducted the Manuka Service, mentioned that Len had been foundation member of that Parish and had carved as an Altar Boy in the church.

To Mrs.Grace Goodwin and family we send our deepest sympathy.

(I am indebted to Laurie McCosker and Frank Crutchett for the above information - Ed.). I have a happy personal memory of Len Goodwin who, for a time, was my sergeant when in Darwin I was O.C.12 Platoon, "B" Company. He and I were in hospital together after the war had ended but before we were discharged and talking about our future, I advised him to return to his pre-war occupation until things had a chance to settle down. Years later he said to

me:"Ted, the only time I didn't take any heed of your advice it led to me becoming wealthy! 0-0-0-0 (Editor)

It will be remembered that some of our troops did not return to Australia from the Middle East with the main body (i.e.the "Rajula" convoy) because they were on duty elsewhere when the Battalion sailed and so they came home in separate convoys later. One of these was Alan Bohlé and the recent death of Monty Siems has prompted him to write the following letter:

carly in 1942, resulting from over-indulgence by the media and assisted by comments from Churchill himself, the Dominion Premiers/Prime Ministers were becoming loud in their protests that most of the fighting was falling to the lot of Dominion Troops. The first Desert Campaign was proclaimed an Australian Victory regardless of the heavy involvement also of British Troops. This caused a considerable outcry in the United Kingdom and, as the Vichy French were fueling Japanese Submarines and Naval Craft in the Indian Ocean, Churchill decided to attack and neutralise Madagascar with a Task Force of all-U.K. Troops.etc. It was at that time that the inimitable magazine "Punch" came out with a relevant poem which, in itself, was something of a short military history of British Armed Achievements. After refueling in Columbo, which harbour we had entered a few metres ahead of a Nip "tin fish", our convoy adopted "wireless silence" and switched back to Mombasa in Natal and we were there to see, unknowingly, one part of the Task Force building up. Later, from the magnificent facilities of the Port of Durban,a handful of people (including our Lieut. I.W. Johnston, Jim Sibilant and myself - Reg Angel missed it because he was upcountry at an Army Camp with troops of our convoy easing their sea legs) witnessed the departure of the remainder of the Task Force. During that mid-morning my attention had been drawn to the uncommon sight of the Aircraft Carrier "H.M.S.EAGLE" making up steam in a half-in/half-out position in a floating dock. This was followed shortly after by the noisy arrival of steam trains along the generous series of parallel railway lines reaching the full length of the mile-or-more of dead straight concrete docks.

From these trains came long lines of troops in single file, wearing tropical kit (all up), extradite him from our battalion and hold in crossing the lines through the gaps between the troop trains, and then led to gang planks fore and aft of the troop ships, emerging in due course to "dress ship" like the Navy. By then the Destroyer Escorts were ploughing down the beautiful harbour followed by "EAGLE" and "RENOWN" and the Landing Craft in pairs. Then, as though controlled by tapes from above, small tugs drew the troopships into the stream to take up their place in the convoy, followed by two A.A.Destroyers as rearguard. The moment the troopers left the wharf the Re-

gimental Bands, English-Scottish-Irish, struck up their Regimental Marches. As "EAGLE" drew abreast of us the R.A.F.Fighter Escort dipped above her in "Salute". Throughout the whole procedure I did not see a halt or hesitation on the wharves or on the water - perfect staff work, perfect discipline, absolute security. Apart from small groups working cargoes, or manning the rail-tracked cranes, there was no-one from Durban to see them off.

I would like the poem from "Punch" to be printed in "W.O.G." in memory of those U.K. men (Contd.)

who served with us and particularly to the delightful personality and performance Monty Siems, both during and after the war. The "originals" will well remember his award on parade of the "Palestine Medal" for the part he played in that campaign. Mention has previously been made of Monty's prowess with a soccer ball but later members of the battalion will also recall the wisardry, with the ball, of the little Scot, WX15860 Pte.J.McKinlay. Few, however, would know of his earlier active service in the Middle East prior to joining us. When the first Campaign Ribbon ("Africa Star") was issued, while the Unit was stationed on the Atherton Tablelands, he approached me and politely informed me that he had qualified for that medal before we did - and could-I arrange for an issue on his behalf? He apparently was with the British Troops who, after all ammunition was expended, had to fight their way out of British Somaliland with the bayonet, against overwhelming odds. Later in Singapore, with the 5th.Commando Division, waiting for aircraft to fly them over the Himalayas to help "Vinegar Joe" Stillwell's forces, his best mate, who was an Australian, confided in him that it was his intention to desert and "jump a go ship" for Australia to join the A.I. McKinlay declined the suggestion to join his mate on such a venture but agreed to go into the city on leave and have "last drinks". Next morning he awakened to the sound of a ship's engines and found himself some hours at sea and heading for Fremantle. The day they tied up at Fremantle he signed on for the A.I.F. - hence his "WX" number, but why he was drafted to a N.S.W. battalion is a matter of mystery. I informed him that all of us issued with a ribbon were subject to confirmation by the in his case. I knew that there was quite a large British H.Q. in Melbourne, mainly for the purpose of administration of badly wou-

Commanding Officer and that could not apply nded and convalescing British Troops. An application through A.I.F. Headquarters be directed to them who would not only be in a position to confirm his medal/ribbon entitlement, through the War Office, but also to custody for Court Martial on the grounds of desertion in Wartime. A very old friend of my Father (who later

became a successful chiropodist, professional musician and outstanding philatellist) as a young man had deserted in Sydney from the Royal Navy before World War 1 and was apprehended on the Desertion Charge in the early 1920's. However, as he had in the intervening years served with the 1st.A.I.F. at Gallipoli and The Somme, etc., that evidence exonerated him from the Desertion Charge and he subsequently lived well into his nineties and died in Artarmon (Sydney) only a few years ago.

Based upon my knowledge of that situation, I advised McKinlay to delay his application for the "AFRICA STAR" medal/ribbon, until he had been in action with 2/4 Bn.
