Major-General Dougherty gave an interesting address on the work and history of Legacy. Legacy was originally formed in Tasmania in 1923 by Maj.-Gen. Sir John Gellibrand, K.C.B., D.S.O., commander of the 3rd Aust. Div. in 1918. Originally it was known as the Remembrance Club and was formed for the purpose to which Legacy is now dedicated, that is, for the care of children and later the widows of

deceased servicemen.

It was started in Melbourne by Sir Stanley Savage (Commander of 17th Brigade in the desert) and in

Sydney in 1926.

The General pointed out that the work of Legacy is increasing every day. In its manifold activities, Legacy had an increase of an average of six new cases each day. These are widows and children of deceased returned soldiers requiring help and guidance in many forms.

Legacy admits that it and its activities cannot fill the gap left by a deceased father but its aim is to assist in any way possible from advice to monetary

assistance.

The General made reference to the donation of £600 to Legacy by the 2/4th Bn. Association in 1946. In conclusion it might be of interest to point out that if and when our Association is wound up our Constitution says that all our assets are to go to Legacy.

After the meeting, Dick Pinson and company got on the piamo, sax and drums, and started to whoop it up a bit. Charlie Hanson, an A grade performer on the saxaphone, gave us a solo, accompanied by Wally Pinson on the piamo. Dick had his face in a glass at this stage I think.

TRAVELLERS TALES

From Johnny Morrison:

"Our captain was really most considerate. Some passengers who had travelled over the route a number of times remarked on the trouble he took to show us the volcano. We approached the island from the blind side of the volcano and he announced that we would go close in as the actual crater was on the opposite side. On arriving at the other side he cruised within four hundred yards of the island. An awe inspiring sight.

"Next stop, Marseilles. We arrived at dusk, went ashore and had a look around. Next morning, took a tour to a fishing village about thirty-five miles out: a refreshing change from Egypt, etc.

"On to England and even the Bay of Biscay was as calm as a mill pond. Arrived at Tilbury at 12.15 a.m. but could not disembark 'til 5 p.m. Drove by car to London and settled down in an hotel, the only time I have been settled since I got here. I had been told and now I know London is the great-

est place on earth (except Sydney of course). Some of the places I have seen so far are: Tower of London, Westminster Abbey, Westminster Cathedral, Parliament House, The Wallace Collection (just a few baubles and paintings—30 million quid's worth). A run by ferry down the Thames to Greenwich. Eighty-five miles by coach down the Thames Valley to Windsor Castle, British Museum, Tate Gallery, St. Paul's, Guildhall, Kensington Palace, and many other places of interest. Even the pubs are an institution; each one is as individual as the inhabitants. Our U.L.V.A. executives should have a look-see.

"Frank Mallett has taken me around to quite a few shops. Really some of them are not shops; they are mansions and the method of presentation is

staggering.

"Have been to Dirty Dick's (no you're wrong, it's an ancient pub), also John Peel's, named after the bloke that introduced the first copper. Also the Cheshire Cheese, another historical pub where Dr. Johnstone used to sip."

And from Alf Carpenter:

30th Jan., '59.

"Fair skies with a land swell but most on board are seasoned sailors by this and all seem to be in light spirits for to-day we are to berth at Adelaide but only for a few hours. We passed Kangaroo Island about mid-day. An announcement over the loud speaker informed us that the ship would be sailing again at 7.45, giving us only three hours, which is not enough time to visit this beautiful city of churches and gardens.

"As we berthed, my brother, Vic, could clearly be seen through the binoculars, sauntering onto the wharf. After a wave he disappeared, to return soon with his wife and baby. The gangplank was soon lowered and we were on the wharf exchanging friendly greetings. Outer Harbour with its one Post Office and one store was hard pressed to cope with the great amount of business which had been thrust upon it so we drove to Port Adelaide and were in time to sample once again some of South Australia's best West End beer.

"Time passed very quickly and soon farewells were under weigh. As we pulled into the Gulf again the lights of Glenelg with their multi-colours cast a fairy-land effect along the coastline. Dinner over we assembled at the verandah bar to listen, in the cool evening breeze, to the piano accordeon and mouth organ playing familiar melodies, a cup of coffee and then ready to retire for the night.

31st Jan. Great Australian Bight.

"It looked as if the Bight had smiled on us, for these waters, famed for their roughness, were as smooth as a mill pond, clear sunshine and everyone in good spirits. Quite a big intake of passengers from Adelaide and new faces seen everywhere.

"During the afternoon a strong wind blew up,

making the sea rough and choppy, and also making the "Flaminia" list to starboard. Many faces again changed colour and extra meals were available for the extra good sailors. Mrs. Carpenter and I are seasoned enough but Russell still gets a little sick.

"Squally rain and heavy seas for the last couple of days have made the Bight live up to its reputation. The old ship stands on her nose and with half of her screw out of the water she bucks as if she

were going to 'buck her brand off'.

"We are due to take on another 150 passengers at Fremantle where we are expected to arrive at 7 p.m. One of the unattached males aboard said, 'Yes! 100 females and 50 males.' Apparently single females are in short supply. I wouldn't know! Or shouldn't anyway.
