from platoons, sections and individuals. All interested are invited to send stories, sketches, etc., of any incident or phase of any campaign to Harry Watts. He is pioneering this work in the early stages."

That, Gentlemen, was fifteen years ago. Harry Watts had collected quite a lot of material for this project which we have together with much more, more recently contributed. All members know that we now have a time limit on our hands due to the winding up of subsidies to unit histories from the War Memorial Trust.

We have been urging members to send in anything that will be of use to those compiling and editing the History. WE WANT THOSE STORIES, DIARIES, ETC., AND WE WANT THEM QUICKLY PLEASE.

Make sure that all events of importance are included in the History. POST THEM AS SOON AS POSSIBLE, OR AT THE LATEST BRING YOUR MATERIAL WITH YOU ON ANZAC DAY.

As you know, a War History Committee has been formed, each member having a particular phase of the Battalion's history in his care, all names and addresses, elsewhere, in this issue.

The Committee has circularised many country newspapers and dozens of country radio stations in an effort to reach those who are out of touch with the Association. In fact the Committee has done everything to get all available material in.

ANNUAL REPORT ON PHOTOGRAPHIC COLLECTION

The photographic records of the Battalion's history are not only growing in size but also in value. Apart from helping members of the Association to recall faces and places they will be of great assistance in the illustration of events which will soon be embodied in the printed history.

The success of this project has been due principally to the enthusiasm of members who have surrendered what must have been in many instances, treasured photos. We have now over one thousand photos. There are six albums and still growing.

This is a pictorial record of people and events associated with the Battalion from the early days in Liverpool with the 5th Coy 2/A.I.F., 1939—the Ingleburn and country camps—the march through Sydney—the departure—convoys through the Middle

East, Palestine, Egypt, Libya, Greece, Crete, Darwin, Tablelands and New Guinea. Also from Prisoner-of-War camps and the War Graves.

Once again I would like to express appreciation for the manner in which members gave these photographs in order to assist the Association build up a pictorial history of the Battalion.

We do not wish to take your private collections or any that may be of sentimental value; it is the spare photo or duplicates which often provide such interesting and valuable additions to our record.

I am indeed grateful for the co-operation I have received.

MEDALS — TIES — ANZAC DAY

A few of our chaps still don't wear medals on Anzac Day. So that we can be completely uniform, your Committee would like ALL RANKS to wear Medals and Unit Tie on that day. If you haven't received your Medals (which you are entitled to), a note applying for same, stating Army No., Rank, and Name, to Army Records Section, Victoria Barracks, Melbourne, will bring results.

For more uniformity, Medals should be worn so that the pin goes through the edge of the lapel (nearest the tie) and then catch it on the coat itself near the sleeve so that the medals then fall level with the top of the pocket.

In all cases (where possible) Unit Ties and medals should be worn to pay last respects to a fallen comrade if we attend a funeral service as a Unit Association.
