ANZAC DAY

- (1) Form up outside the Occidental Hotel, York Street, City, 8 a.m., in preparation for the Combined March and Wreath Laying Ceremony with 4th Bn. 1914-18 and thence to the form-up place in Macquarie Street, for the main march.
- (2) At completion of the march all members will proceed to the embussing point and as soon as each bus is full it will depart immediately for the Manresa

- Hall, Carlow Street, North Sydney. Cec Crystall will be acting "Bus Marshall" so if in doubt ask Cec.
- (3) On arrival at the Manresa the function will get under way. There will be plenty of eats and plenty of other refreshments so there will be no need to stop off at any other water hole on the way.
