PRESIDENT'S REPORT, 1964

With the close of another year in the life of the Association, I have pleasure in submitting the following report in respect of activities during 1964.

Your Committee worked zealously throughout the period with each member fully justifying the confidence evidenced in his appointment.

On 6th November, the Association attained its majority, after an unbroken existence of twenty-one years from the date of inauguration.

Looking back over this long lapse of time it is of particular interest and a matter of pride that our organisation has retained its strength and virility and has displayed no evidence of decay. This is due mainly to the holding of regular monthly meetings and the editing and dissemination of our journal "White Over Green", the former affording numerous members the opportunity of retaining personal and regular contact with each other and the latter in detailing Association social activities and items of interest regarding the progress and movements of individual members.

Outstanding features of the year were the unqualified success of the Lismore reunion, the annual 4th and 2/4th combined reunion which coincided with our twenty-first birthday and the Ladies' Night at which Sir Iven and Lady Mackay were guests of honour.

Finally, my particular thanks are extended to members of the Committee, as also to members generally, for their constant support throughout the year.
