1967 COMBINED "SMOKO" By Harry Gjedsted

A strong delegation of 4 Bn. A.I.F. 1914-18 Association, and representative groups from 4 Bn. Royal Australian Regt., 4 Bn. R.N.S.W.R., 4 Bn. 1939-45, and Parramatta Pipe Band were the highlights of a well attended and enjoyable Combined Smoko Night.

After opening the evening, one minute's silence in Remembrance of Fallen and Departed Comrades was observed. Apologies were received from Maj. Gen. Dougherty, Major Boyce, "Slim" Pollock, Bede Keary and "Rusty" McWilliam, and a telegram wishes for a successful evening — have one for me", was received from Queensland Vice-President Tom Provians. Thanks to the co-operation and organisation of Transport by Cec Chrystal and members of our Association, 11 members of 4 Bn. A.I.F. 1914-18 Assn. attended the function, headed by newly appointed President Jack Noakes and Secretary Harry Stafford, who, he told me, has also been "promoted" to Treasurer, and now carries the dual role of Secretary/ Treasurer. (That's worth another stripe, Harry).

This would be one of the largest delegations from our old friends for some years, and it is obvious that if we can overcome the transport problems for future occasions we will see more of them at our functions. Organisation of groups in localities for pick up could be worked out by Harry, and, if he lets our Secretary George Stack know transport requirements, we will then make the necessary arrangements.

4 Bn. Royal Australian Regiment was represented by Capt. Brennan (originally the R.S.M. of 4 Bn. R.A.R.)

and Corporal Curnow.

4 Bn. R.N.S.W.R. was represented by the Bn. C.O. Lieut. Col. Maitland, E.D., Lieut. Wall, R.S.M. Aspinall, S/Sgt. Zalanarder, Sgt. Raynor, B. Wall and S. McLaughlin.

4 Bn. 1939-45 was represented by Geoff Tuckwell. (President), Ken Menser (Vice-President) and Tom

Parramatta Pipe Band representatives were Bill Ford and John Erby.

Bill extended an invitation to all 2/4th-ers to attend the Clan night being held at Parramatta Town Hall

on Saturday, 2nd December. This invitation was also extended to all visitors present at the Smoko and Bill assured us that adequate supplies of "Duggan's Dew" would be on hand. The "Password" to gain admittance is "2/4 Bn.".

Amongst our visitors was Major Tom Hall, ex

4 Bn. R.N.S.W.R., who is now holding a training appointment at Eastern Command. Tom brought a film to the Smoko of specific interest to the 1914-18 boys because it showed 4 Bn. 1914-18 on active service but it was of tremendous interest to all of us because it showed the original A.I.F. from its recruiting days in 1914, through Gallipoli, Palestine and France to the end of the war. A wonderful film that should be shown again if possible. Amongst members present was Victorian Vice-President Vic Francis, who was in Sydney for a short stay. It was wonderful to see you Vic and it was obvious that you were enjoying yourself.

How wonderful it was to see Mick Gray again. Mick is an old friend of mine of many years standing, and has had a long and distinguished record of service in the Army. We both served together in 9 Field Brigade R.A.A. back in 1934 when Field Artillery was horse-drawn and to be a mounted man you had to "win your spurs" in the true sense of the word.

In 1936 Mick went to England and joined the Horse Guards (The "Blues") and later transferred to the Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders. In 1937 his Bn. was in action on the north-west frontier, India, and Mick gained his first campaign medal — the North West Frontier Medal. When World War II appeared imminent, Mick returned to Australia with the object of joining the A.I.F. when war broke out. He joined the Australian Instructional Corps, and when war did break out, we both enlisted and joined 2/4 Bn. together. Mick saw action in Libya, Greece and Crete, and was wounded in a grenade exchange with German paratroopers on Crete.

On our return to Palestine, Mick was one of those selected from the A.I.F. to join a British Commando Group to study commando tactics, use of explosives, etc., and later this group demonstrated these tactics

and activities to the Bn.

When the Bn. returned to Australia, and went to Darwin, Mick and a number of N.C.O.'s were seconded to a Militia Bn. located in Darwin, with the purpose of training it up to A.I.F. standard.

In 1945 both he and I were amongst those selected to join the British Army in India in preparation for the re-invasion of Malaya and after Japan's surrender, Mick was one of those officers who were selected for

the War Crimes Commission in Tokyo.

On his return to Australia in 1947, Mick continued his service in the Regular Army and after assisting in the reforming of the C.M.F. and serving with 30 Bn. N.S.W. Scottish Regt. he was promoted and appointed to Provost Marshall, Eastern Command, with the object of developing and establishing this particular unit.

Mick's subsequent appointments and promotions have taken him to Korea, Malaya and Vietnam, and he has now retired, after a long and loyal period of service in the Army, with his last campaign medal the Vietnamese Star - gained in 1967, 30 years exactly from his first campaign medal in 1937.

Welcome home, Mick, we'll be looking forward to

seeing you at our monthly meetings.

Also at our Smoko were the "Bundeena Boys" -Ernie Swain and Dick Chamberlain. Ernie brought his father — Dick Swain — who is President of Bundeena R.S.L. Club. The Bundeena boys have arranged everything for a visit from us for Anniversary weekend so set aside Sunday, 28th January, 1968, for a family day out at Bundeena. There will be speed boat rides for young and old and plenty of refreshments to cover all ages and tastes. Barbecue facilities will be available, all that the boys ask us to do is bring our own steaks and sausages.
