
# ANZAC DAY WREATH LAYING

All members of our Association — indeed, all exmembers of 2/4th Australian Infantry Battalion are requested to join our Patron, General Dougherty, our President, Harry Gjedsted, and members of the Executive at a solemn Wreathlaying Ceremony at the Cenotaph on Anzac morning, prior to assembling for the main march.

This year our old friends of 4th Bn., '14-'18, will be marching with us, preceded by "our" Parramatta Pipe Band.

Arrangements are as follows:-

FALL IN: at 0800 hours at the corner of York and Erskine Streets opposite Wynyard Park (look for the "White Over Green" banner).

MOVE OFF: March to the Cenotaph led by 4th Bn. and preceded by the Parramatta Pipe Band.

AT THE CENOTAPH: Marchers will halt, face the Cenotaph and remain silent while the wreaths are being placed.

MARCH ON: The March will continue to our usual assembly point in Phillip Street—members of 4 Bn. '14-'18 will break off at the Pitt Street intersection.

Members are asked to make this year's wreathlaying Ceremony the best attended yet. It is **the** occasion in the year that we have, as a Unit, a public ceremony in remembrance of our **Fallen Comrades**. Please play your part in making this ceremony as meaningful as it should be by being present at 0800 hours on Anzac Day.

Sprigs of rosemary will be distributed at the Assembly area and **Battalion Ties** and **lapel Badges** will also be available. Decorations should be worn.

#### ANZAC DAY REUNION

The Anzac Day Luncheon and Reunion traditionally our largest gathering will this year be bigger than ever. Our old friends of 4th Bn. '14-'18 have decided at last to join us on Anzac Day at Manresa Hall and hold their luncheon simultaneously. We welcome their decision.

For many ex-members of our battalion this is the only day in the year they have a chance to attend a gathering and we all look forward eagerly to seeing them. General Dougherty will be attending.

#### BATTALION PARADES TO FAREWELL C.O.

The 4th Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment, had a changeover of commanding officers recently.

Lt.-Col. C. H. A. East, who has been C.O. of 4RAR since November, 1966, has taken up the post of commanding officer of the 1st Recruit Training Battalion, Kapooka, NSW, and promoted to colonel.

In a traditional ceremony at the Sergeants' Mess, Lt.-Col. East was farewelled by the RSM WOI A. C. Toghill, and Mess members. He wore a Malaysian headdress and a red Songkok—a custom adopted by the Battalion during a tour of duty at Terendak Garrison, Malaysia.

About 600 soldiers of the Battalion paraded at Enoggera to give their final send-off to Lt.-Col. East, and, following the parade, officers' wives and families farewelled Lt.-Col. and Mrs. East in the Officers' Mess.

The new C.O. of 4 RAR is Lt.-Col. L. R. Greville, formerly Chief Instructor at the Royal Military College, Duntroon, and he will command the Battalion when it goes to Vietnam later this year.

In preparation for duty in SVN, 4 RAR will undergo intensive training in tropical warfare at the Jungle Training Centre, Canungra, followed by company and battalion build-up exercises. The final training will take place in the Shoalwater Bay area.
