### LETTER FROM THE PHILIPPINES

From Harry Sundstrom to Tom Provians: "Despite all my good intentions I just don't seem to be able to find time or opportunity to contact you, however you'll be flattered to realise that this note is the result of a very determined effort. Late last year I was invited by the President of the University of the Philippines (U.P.) to accept the post of Professor in Zootachnics (Animal Husbandry plus vet. science) at the Veterinary College. The bustle of getting away, plus the wedding of Number two daughter just didn't leave me any time for anything. I have my wife with me — most of the 2/4 boys knew her whilst she was a sister at Gaza Ridge, 1st A.G.H. where she was called **Swanny** and I think most of the fellows were at our wedding which was held at the hospital at Gaza.

The first month of our stay was spent in indecent luxury at one of the super hotels and then we moved into a very nice cottage adjacent to the University. Strangely, there are very few Australians over here, and to date — apart from the Embassy staff — I know of only two others and consequently I'm regarded as an oddity. There are plenty of Americans but they do not appear to be very popular. Australia and Australians are very highly regarded and hence wherever I go I receive V.I.P. treatment. On New Year's Eve I was invited to a very posh night club, where celebrations were being held in honour of the Miss Asian contestants. Around midnight Miss Japan went to the mike and spoke in Japanese and explained this meant Happy New Year in Japanese, Miss Burma, Miss Thailand, Miss China, etc., etc., all followed and spoke in their own language. Then

everything was quiet and I noticed the people were all looking at our table; a waiter came along and something which I didn't understand — "What the hell goes on?" I said to Swanny. Just then the orchestra blared out a bar of Waltzing Matilda; the waiter then took my arm and sidled me up to the mike. I was dumbfounded, but rallying to the cause I said, "Woolloomooloo, Gundagai, Toowoomba, and that Ladies and Gentlemen means Happy New Year in Australian." Yells and cheers followed, the orchestra struck up Waltzing Matilda, and I had to sing the damn thing; however everyone joined in, much to my amazement. I found out later that this tune was all the rage in the islands. This incident received publicity from the press people who were present and as a consequence I am being continually asked to speak Australian — (I'm lucky I have a map of Australia with me otherwise I'd run out of names) and to sing Waltzing Matilda, this latter request I decline with great professional dignity. These people are delightful folk, happy and courteous with a great sense of humour. I am enjoying working with them, and even although some of the jobs I'm tackling are pretty rough they are always willing to come along with me.

I've never in my life seen such traffic, it is just crazy, and I absolutely refuse to drive. The only traffic rule observed is "Thou shalt not hit the car in front." I really have the jitters each time I go through Manila. One wonderful thing tho' the beer is better than Australian beer — hard to believe and only \(^4\) the price, cigarettes are about half Aust. price, but the beef and butter!! so costly that they

are luxuries. One thing I can't become accustomed to, is the national dress, this consists of wearing a very heavily embroided shirt with long sleeves, open neck, and worn outside of the trousers. Although its cool and comfortable I just can't accustom myself to it. I intended to forward \$2 for W.O.G. membership, but at present it's just about impossible to send currency out of the country, and I'm in the middle of a very involved process of short circuiting my cash and having it sent to my bank in Australia, what a job, so will you accept me as a member - non financial — until I can straighten out this mess. Sure you can bring in as much cash as you like, but send it out!!! Phew! It took me two days to buy some Australian currency to send back with my youngest daughter — who was over here with us for six weeks however I'll straighten this out soon.

Thanks for sending me your news sheet and I am looking forward to hearing news of the 2/4th".

## THE TREASURER'S REPORT

In presenting this, my last financial statement, I feel that I should make a few suggestions regarding the Association's activities in as far as they affect our finances.

The Benevolent Fund today is in a healthy condition but to date has not been called on to any great extent. However, this will not be the continuing picture. We are all getting older and our list of departed Comrades is increasing each year and it can be anticipated that this Fund will, in the next five years, be called upon to make substantial payments to and on behalf of our members.

The task before us in this regard therefore is to devise ways and means of enticing a very large influx of money and as soon as possible. Our tangible assets at this time consist of a current Account amounting to \$373.54. Your Committee this year agreed to my recommendation to invest \$1,500 in the R.S.L. Permanent Building Society and the following Association monthly meeting endorsed their action.

I am of the opinion that every endeavour should be made to increase this investment to \$2,500 and to build up the Current Account to at least \$500 so that we will be in a position to meet reasonable calls for assistance. This amount invested would return some \$150.0. p.a. increasing each year by .09 per

cent.

As for the General Account, I feel that the position here needs some close attention. At the moment we have only \$281.53 to work on as \$300.00 has been tied up at Port Macquarie since January last — in

my opinion unnecessarily.

The aim should be for a working amount of \$1,000.00 to allow some expansion in our Social activities. To do this, we must raise funds by means other than subscriptions. I think that the Committee in particular, and the Association in general should give this matter their serious and early consideration.

Finally, as good as your Committee is, it would be 100 per cent more effective if this Association got

down to brass tacks and formed a Ladies' Auxiliary and I'm willing to bet that once they got going, I can see not only a strong, active, working group centred on the Metropolitan area but Country groups at such places as Cowra, Tamworth, Wagga, Lismore-Casino, Woy Woy and that possibly others would also form up at other centres and as a result of all this the targets that I have suggested for the Benevolent Fund and also our General Account would be reached within two years at the very outside.

I wish to extend my thanks to you all for having me as your Honorary Treasurer and for the help given me in my job by members generally and also by my colleagues on the Committee. To all the Country, Interstate and Metropolitan members who forwarded their fees, etc. — thanks — especially for the many kind wishes expressed by those whom I

knew personally prior to my leaving the Unit. To you, Mr. President I can only wish you and yours and to all Members and their families, health wealth and happiness and I promise that as circumstances permit, I will see you all from time to time in the future. I give up my job with a great deal of regret but I feel that this is the right thing to do for many reasons, particularly as far as my health is concerned.

Finally, I extend to my successor best wishes for his tenure of office.

From Ken Moses:

"Dear George, Great to hear from you and thank you all for your best wishes. I'm getting on fairly well now and have been home a fortnight from Heidelberg and dabbling in a bit of work, mainly at home but visiting the office for a few hours every day. However it was a pretty close call. I was out to it for 14 days in the intensive care ward before I was moved down to ward 9A. They reckoned I was 5/2 on for the slab for a couple of days but you can't keep a 9000 number down. My daughter flew down from Canberra for 13 days but I did not know she was here. However she is down for this week-end to have a look at me and to allow me to carry on an intelligent conversation with her.

It will take some time but I can hobble around and the main thing is that I can write. The firm was great. Although I had only been with them since February I was on full pay all the time. They still won't let me work too hard, although I have been doing a lot of stories from home.

I will send you a copy of the next paper and you will see a full page account of my experiences in the Repat. Hospital with appropriate remarks about the food.

I'm not allowed to drive the car so my youngest daughter is taking driving lessons and I will have a chauffeur.

In the paper I will mark some of the other stories I wrote so that you will see that I have lost my old form altogether.

I would love to come to Sydney for a while and see all the mob, especially Johnny Meehan, Tiny Blakeley, Rusty and all the others, but I'm afraid that it will be some time yet as I have to have a lot more check-ups and will be under constant supervision for a while. There would be a hell of a lot to talk over although I'm strictly a soda water man now.

Do you know if there are any more of the war histories left, as I think I have a customer down here who wants a copy. I lent my copy to a chap at work who is a sergeant in the C.M.F. After reading it he is seriously thinking of resigning.

Sorry you had such a rough time with the weather at Katoomba over the school holidays. The first week down here was pretty good, we even reached a 77 but the last week looks like being a bit rough, we had a 56 today and it has been hovering around that mark for the last few days, but log fires and electric blankets don't make it too bad.

Vicki, who is 22, is up in Canberra in the National Library, and the **Houston family** have been quite good to her. Jillian who is 18 was up in Canberra for a while seeing Vicki, stopped with the **Houstons** and had quite a good time. The wonder boy **Kenneth Andrew Campbell Moses** is nine.

Again very many thanks for the well wishes and regards to Cec, Cock, Sailor and all the other boys. Maybe we will meet in the not too distant future. Kindest regards to you and all the family and the respectable mob at Naval House."
