Champers for 2nd/Fourth

Toast to the illustrious 2/4th Battalion A.I.F. at a reunion dinner held in Port Macquarie on Saturday night to mark the thirtieth year of the battalion's as-

sociation was honoured with champagne.

A more convivial gathering would not be possible, with 145 men of the battalion re-kindling the flame of the esprit-de-corps for which the 2/4 is as famous as it is for the fighting capabilities displayed in two world wars.

A Japanese Samurai sword was later used to cut the birthday cake, which depicted 30 years for the association — and the cake was iced in the theme of the famous colour patch, white over green.

The sword was one of "the spoils" of the battalion's

islands campaign.

Many of the men, and their wives, travelled hundreds of miles to be present at the reunion.

They came to Port Macquarie from as far north as Millaa Millaa in Queensland to Adelaide in the south.

Port Macquarie was kind to the visitors—the sun shone brightly for their three-day visit; the women's auxiliary of the local R.S.L. sub-branch catered magnificently for the men and their wives, upwards of 300 people all told, and Mr. Dick Bawden, masterminded the arrangements so splendidly that not one hitch occurred in a hefty and hectic three-day programme.

Great pride exuded from Dick Bawden as he welcomed his friends of "the finest unit ever to don a

haversack"

The great pride within me, he said, arises from our years together as a fighting unit, and the ties binding us grow stronger year by year as we dedicate ourselves to the welfare of others not as fortunate as ourselves.

He referred to the presence of wives, sons and daughters as the correct approach, and said the best way to perpetuate the memory of the 2/4th was "through the hearts and minds of those we love".

Silent Toast

"This is a time for serious thought; a time for each to his own thoughts", said Sir Ivan Dougherty in a toast to "Fallen Comrades".

The occasion was the more memorable because of the presence of Major General Sir Ivan Dougherty, C.B.E., D.S.O., E.D., Patron of the 2/4th Battalion Association and its war-time leader in the Western Desert, Greece and Crete.

Lady Dougherty accompanied him.

V.C. winner George Cartwright was also at the reunion, as a guest of the Association.

Toast of Champagne

Mr. Charles Morgan referred in glowing terms to the proud record of the 2/4th Battalion when proposing the toast that was honoured with champagne.

He praised the bravery of the men sitting before him who had been exposed to death at close quarters with the enemy in four major campaigns in different parts of the world; he said Port Macquarie shared the pride and pleasure of the battalion that Major-General Sir Ivan Dougherty, who had led them to Libya, Tobruk and Benghazi, and through the Greece and Crete campaigns, was present among them that evening.

The men of the battalion gave Sir Ivan a standing ovation after the toast was honoured.

"Our attendance here in such numbers reflects the esprit de corp for which the battalion is famous; it also reflects the great team spirit which has carried on in our Association since its inception 30 years ago," said Mr. Harry Gjedsted, its president, when responding to the toast.

He said he couldn't think of any better toast to be honoured with champagne, and he recalled that the 6th Division attack on Bardia was the first defeat of the enemy in World War II. It was a 6th Division victory; it was a 2/4 Battalion victory, he said.

The pulling down of the flag after the capture of Tobruk signified the eventual defeat of the Axis powers; it was a 2/4th Battalion hat that was raised in its stead, and it was raised by a man of the 2/4th, he said.

Sir Ivan Dougherty, with the women present and enjoying coffee, said the spirit of the 2/4th Battalion displayed before them that evening had always been the same; it has always been reflected in everything they have done— in training, in battle, and in peacetime.

Sir Ivan said he was one always critical of those who would not allow the famous colour patch to be worn today.

A toast to the visitors was proposed by Mr. Bruce Mulquiney.

Mr. Mulquiney, with his wife Muriel, came from Sydney for the reunion; the toast was responded to by Mr. Ken Radley and Mr. C. T. Uptin.

Other guests present included Mr. Bruce Cowan, M.L.A., Ald. C. C Adams (mayor), Mr. J. H. Steep, H. C. Butler, S. J. Condon, A. Tyndall, Ken Dick, and the members of the Parramatta Pipe Band.
