## **ESCAPE FROM GERMANY**

(Concluding the account by the late Bill Irvine, M.M., of his escape from a German P.O.W. Camp in 1944.)

We had only got clear of the barracks when we crossed a bitumen road. We were going to boil up here but we had the jitters and gave it away, decided to get along quietly and keep a good look out for we felt the place was not good for us. We had perhaps gone on another hundred yards when we heard the gutteral German voices of two sentries having a conversation at the end of their beat. We pulled up dead and went for cover in the scrub. Basil had a map in his pocket which he destroyed and we realised if we were caught in this area with civvy clothes on we would be shot. How we got so far into this area without being seen is a mystery. There were big grey buildings everywhere with each one bearing a number. They had been built right in amongst the pine forest and were even very difficult to see unless you walked right into them. It must have been perfect cover from the air. We lay very quietly for what appeared to be hours, but it really could not have been more than a few minutes and then we knew that the guards had moved off for the conversation stopped. When the guards first stopped talking we thought they had discovered us as we were only about 30 yards away from them. It took us hours to get out of that area. We had to cross a railway that led into his underground facory area, before we got across to a mountainous ridge that was covered with pine and it gave us excellent cover. We could see some German barracks across on the other side of the railway line that we had crossed and there was a high wire-netting fence enclosing the factory area. We sat on the side of the mountain and watched the German soldiers going back to their posts.

It was a great relief to get clear of this place and we decided to be very careful in the near future. We had neither time nor cover in which to boil the pot and have something to eat until well on into the afternoon and were dead beat so had a good rest before we resumed our journey. We were considerably bucked up when we sighted our Air Force coming over again in strength and it gave us a new lease of life. We made camp early and bedded down on heaps of oak leaves and pine needles. We were close to a small stream and when we went down to get some water to boil we saw a decent sized fish in a small pool which we tried to catch, but had no luck. However we had a good wash while chasing it round the

pool. We were getting near an area where there was plenty of fruit and the scrounging was much easier. People working in the fields were very good to us and here we met a peasant plowing his little piece of ground, his wife had brought him his smoko and we were invited to have something to eat and a drink of coffee while his wife went back to the village to get some provisions. When she arrived back with bread and coffee she said she would go with us for a little distance and show us where we could get some apples and pears and when we got to the trees she helped us to gather them. These people were most kind and generous with anything they were to give us and did not expect anything in return. They directed us to an area controlled by the Partisans who kept us in tow till we reached the Slovak capital Banska Bystrica. By this time a Slovak uprising took place and the whole Slovak Army with their German equipment rebelled, took to the hills, joined the Partisans and played hide and seek with the Jerrys in the mountains. When we reached Banska Bystrica we met up with about 14 American Air Force chaps who had made forced landings in Slovakia and been placed in concentration camps. They were immediately released when the trouble broke out. Bratislaya was the capital of Slovakia before the uprising but Jerry took command there and the Slovaks made Banska-Bystrica their capital.

We were billeted in a slovak Air Force barracks in this town and while there a British liaison officer was dropped by parachute and we contacted him. He in turn got through by wireless to Allied H.Q. and informed them that there were some escaped British and Americans P.O.W. in Banska-Bystrica and asked if we could be assisted out. Well, after being there for quite a spell we got word that a plane would be sent in after us, but thought that was just so much hoo-ey, as those sort of things usually happen in books but that is what evenutally happened only that two Flying Fortresses with a dozen Mustang Fighters for an escort landed on a drome about 12 kilos from the town and we were whisked away to Bari in Italy. This was in September, 1944, so we were well out of it before the war was over.

Basil and I were taken first to the 26 American General Hospital at Bari where we had our civvy clothes taken from us and we were equipped with all U.S.A. Army gear. We were handed over to the British later on and spent sometime in the 8th Army Rest Camp at Bari before being shifted to Naples and Taranto where we took the boat for Alexandria and train to Maadi Camp outside Cairo. We were there for about 8 days and then went to Port Tufik where we boarded the Orontes and travelled to Bombay. We left the ship there and spent over a week at Colarbo Camp before getting an American troopship "General A. E. Anderson", for good old Aussie. We arrived home on 17th November, 1944 — just too late to see the Melbourne Cup. I was very disappointed not being able to go to England and Scotland, but we saw quite a bit of Europe although we did not have much time to admire the scenery. Basil and I received the Military Medal for our trouble - but I'd sooner have had the trip to England.
