ESCAPE FROM GERMANY

(Continuing the account by the late Bill Irvine, M.M., of his escape from a German P.O.W. Camp in 1944.)

Whenever we saw our Air Force we used to think it was the right time to ask some of the peasants for a handout. It was not very often that we saw any farm houses away from the villages, however we ran into one not very far from the edge of a pine forest so we decided to try for something to eat. Usually we got some little thing but on this occasion we were knocked back and we suspected that he was a pro-German at least. He was rather a nasty type but I guess he was half afraid to do anything to the pair of us. We had left our gear inside the forest before going over to the house so we went back and packed it up. We had just got into the forest and on looking back found that he had left the house and was following us. It was just about dusk so we moved further back into the forest and we had him out in the clear. We were going to camp where we had first left our gear but decided it was not a very healthy spot and moved on for a mile or so before bedding down for the night. We had decided that we would get moving as soon as it was light enough for we did not feel too easy about the locality but we were due for a very unpleasant day. We did not have time to boil the pot and make a drink of ersatz coffee before getting underway, deciding we would travel for a couple of hours and then have smoko. This area was strangely deserted of humans and we never suspected that we were walking right into trouble. We had passed over a road into another forest when we saw three notices spaced about 50 yards apart saying that no one was permitted to pass into that area and if caught they were likely to be shot. The notices looked old and had been shot at with stones and a couple appeared to have stopped a charge of shot so we did not take too much notice of them and kept going in the forbidden direction until we ran up against three army barracks rooms that also appeared to be deserted and after getting within fifty yards of them we decided to take a wide circle around them without investigating what they contained. There was not a sound or a soul about and it was rather uncanny.
