WELFARE REPORT

It is with a heavy heart that I report the passing during the last four weeks of two very fine and remarkable people I have been visiting, Eileen Copland and Fred Searle.

From a very early age Eileen dedicated her life to the service of her fellow man, particularly ex-servicemen and women. When John first met her some forty years ago, she was actively assisting the blinded of World War I, and from then until recently, when she learned she was suffering from an incurable illness she continued her tireless work. She served in executive positions with the Women's Auxiliary of the Ryde R.S.L. from 1948 to 1970, when due to ill health, she did not nominate for re-election. In 1961 she was awarded the League's Certificate of Appreciation for services rendered. In addition to this, for a period of 20 years she was a very active member of the local Branch of Red Cross, during which time she played a full and useful part in all their activities in organising and conducting the Blood Bank. The Royal Ryde Homes Auxiliary also knew her as an able and untiring worker over 17 years. Eileen was laid to rest after a service at St. Anne's, Ryde, and then the Northern Suburbs Crematorium, and the large attendance clearly indicated the high esteem in which she was held. They included Lady MacKay and a strong contingent of Association members and wives headed by our President Harry Gjedsted.

Of Fred Searle my remarks will be brief and personal. Our President will pay a tribute to him in our next edition of W.O.G.

It is almost impossible for me to grasp the fact that the irrepressible, effervescent and tireless Fred is

no longer with us and my thought is, if we would all take a leaf from his book, what a truly great Association we would have.

Full honours were paid to Fred at a service at St. Anne's, Ryde, and then at the Northern Suburbs Crematorium which was attended by approximately 60 Association members and wives, led by our Patron Sir Ivan Dougherty and our President Harry Gjedsted. Ryde R.S.L., of which Fred and Dot were both active members, conducted a most impressive service.

Of these two dedicated people the words of Abou Ben Adhem are certainly true: "Write me as one who

loves his fellow men."
