# VALE! FRED SEARLE

The sudden illness and unexpected death of Fred Searle came as a shock and brought sadness and sorrow to us all.

Fred was an original member of our Battalion. He enlisted in 1939 at the outbreak of the Second World War and served in "A" Coy. throughout most of the campaigns in which the Battalion was engaged. His loyalty, friendliness, integrity and sincerity were qualities that remained with him throughout his life, and these, coupled with his cheerful disposition, made him many lifelong friends.

Fred was one of the Great Men of our Association—he was an untiring worker in all the association's activities, and gave devoted and dedicated service as a member, committeeman and treasurer, and, in addition to so many other things, will always be remembered for his wonderful work as Welfare Officer, and his regular visits to Concord Repat. Hospital.

His work and his contribution to building and strengthening our Association was recognised in 1968 when he was made an Honorary Life Member of the 2/4 Aust. Inf. Bn. Association.

On Tuesday, 10th March, 1970, a large assembly of Association members, including our Patron and wives and widows of members, attended St. Anne's Church, Ryde, and Northern Suburbs Crematorium to pay our Last Tributes and Respects to our Comrade Friend and Association Life Member, and extend our Deepest Sympathy to Dorothy, daughter Jacqueline and son-in-law Norman, Relatives and Friends.

The large gathering at the services, the many floral tributes and the messages of condolence reflect the high esteem and regard in which Fred was held, and addresses of tribute were made by your President and Welfare Officer of Ryde Sub-Branch of the R.S.L. where Fred had also served as a committeeman for many years.

Our Association will be so much poorer by the loss of Fred. We will always remember him, and be grateful for the invaluable contribution that he — and Dorothy — made to the continued strength of our Association.

He has left us to join the ranks of our other Comrades who gave their lives during the War, or who have passed on since.

He will be sadly missed by us all.

#### WELFARE REPORT

Recently we received a request from Ken Moses, Sig. Pl. for assistance in providing information to support a Repatriation Claim he is making for recognition of a very serious disability suffered due to War Service. Ken's request was in three phases:

1. Evidence of any physical and mental stress imposed on him during his service with the 2/4 Bn., also substantiation of the esteem in which he was held by those with whom he served.

2. The regimental number and name, approximate date, and, where possible, cause of death of any of our

members who have passed away in the last twelve months.

3. The same information as in para 2 of any member who has passed away since he returned from active service.

Due to the efforts of our President, Harry Gjedsted, statutory declarations have been obtained and forwarded to Ken from the following: Sir Ivan Dougherty, Paul Tomlinson, Ferdie Pegg, Cec Chrystal, John Meehan, Ron Belford and Bob Lane.

The second phase of Ken's request is at present being attended to by **Dick Faulder** and **John Copland** and Ken should have this information within 10 days and we trust this evidence will win him the recognition from Repat for which he should not be required to

fight so strenuously.

Ken has enlisted the assistance of a very eminent Victorian Queen's Counsel, himself an ex-R.A.A.F. type, and they both feel it is high time the Repatriation Department looked with more concern and sympathy at the alarming sickness and mortality rate among personnel from our war and recognised the fact that the majority of us did, in fact, due to our service, suffer some physical or mental damage which is now becoming so tragically apparent.

This is the reason for the third phase of Ken's request and he and his counsel hope that by presenting this list to Repat. they will obtain more generous

assistance for all ex-service personnel.

It isn't necessary for me to tell you what a battler for our cause Ken is, or where his heart lies, and for that reason your committee is backing him to the hilt.

**Dick Faulder, John Copland** and myself have undertaken to carry out the research necessary to provide the second list and we earnestly request the assistance of each and every one of you.

We feel the day has gone when mere Hospital visiting and the handing out of small comforts was sufficient and we must make the word welfare mean

what it says.

Regimental number. Initials and name.

Approximate date, place and cause of death.

Sender's name and address.
