Wedding Bells at Pymble.

On Friday, 29th May, at 6.30 p.m., Virginia, the eldest daughter of our Senior Vice-president, Russell McWilliam, and Barbara, was married to Richard ("Rick") Fisher at the Presbyterian Church, Pymble. The ceremony was followed by a reception at the Crystal Room, Victor Street, Chatswood, and was attended by many relatives and friends, including the father, sister, brother and friends of the groom, who came all the way from New Zealand for this

To Russ and Barbara we extend our congratulations and to Virginia and Rick, we give our sincere congratulations and best wishes for a long, healthy and

happy life together.

"Return to Wewak" Mr. Dennis Barnhard, President of Wewak Subbranch R.S.L., was in Sydney during May, and the opportunity was taken to invite him to our Committee Meeting on Tuesday, 26th May, and the June meeting.

Mr. Barnhard gave a broad outline of the "Return

to Wewak" plan, the main points being:

(1) The project is planned to commemorate the 25th Anniversary of the surrender of the Japanese forces in Wewak (13th September, 1945), and will be held in the period Friday, 11th to Monday, 14th September, 1970, with Sunday, 13th September, being the main day. On this day the Memorial Park will be opened on the exact time and date of the surrender.

(2) The R.S.L. is a small group, approximately 25 Europeans and 90 non-Europeans—and has little or no funds, however, the project has become a community development, and practically every person in Wewak has given their full co-operation in the effort to make this a wonderful occasion for those who can attend. School children, natives, service personnel, business people, have all given freely of their time and

effort in "getting the show on the road," with most of the work being concentrated on beautifying the area where the surrender actually took place, into a parkland area of shrubs and flowers. The actual spot where the surrender took place is marked with an obelisk, which was recently located by members of the Wewak R.S.L. Does anybody know its origin? It stands on the actual spot where the surrender table stood, and for years has been overgrown with jungle foliage. The R.S.L. had an enormous job locating it and have now raised it several feet, and by having it surmounted on a raised slab with steps on four sides, have made it into a Memorial.

(3) There will be no problem re accommodation, and by co-operation of the local people, Mr. Barnhard states that accommodation will be in "billeting" form at a cost of \$4 per person per night (B. & B.)

(4) Travelling will be by air, — fares in the vicinity of \$400; however, if we can get an indication of how many will be going, charter fares can be obtained at the attractive price of \$232. (Our Association can work in with 6 Div. Association on this-so please indicate to us as soon as possible if you plan to go.)

(5) Invitations have been extended by Wewak R.S.L.

(6) Extensive entertainment has been planned including a "Sing-Sing" by the natives, and all attending are assured of a wonderful time.

Sub-branch at Dongarra, where Reg. has lived, has learnt the following particulars: His disc shows POW (Germany) No. 8295, Front Stalag 183. Other information was that he had been hit in the kidneys by coal trucks in POW days—thought to have been squeezed between trucks.

Would anyone being aware of this accident to Reg. and prepared to make a Statutory Declaration to that affect, contact us immediately. The evidence is required to support a Repatriation claim on behalf of the widow.
