AN ACHIEVEMENT

Members were keen to attend the Return to Wewak Ceremonies, some making deposits for the air fare and there were those prepared to try their luck in the \$10 Guessing Competition in the hope of winning their fare. However, there were insufficient starters to ensure the block booking fare of \$232 and also air fares were increased just prior to the trip. Therefore your Executive, led by President Harry and through our Patron, Sir Ivan and Jim Brown (M.L.A.) approached the Government to make available Service Transport.

The two-pronged "attack" directed at the Prime Minister, on the one hand and the Minister for Air on the other, brought a sympathetic response, but many hours of phoning, writing and worrying on the part of Pres. Harry, Bill MacLennan and others were required before a V.I.P. plane was made available. This was smartly filled with V.I.P.'s—back to square one!

More sweat, blood and tears finally achieved a Hercules Transport for the trip, which was a better proposition in any case, as it could carry at least 60 personnel.

In the meantime, your committee, as directed by a General Meeting, had drawn up a priority list, headed by George Stack as our selected representative, followed by those who had paid deposits, then those who had entered the Wewak sweepstake, followed by those whom the Committee in their wisdom felt should be included for various reasons.

Many members were contacted to check on availability and interest. Doubtlessly, there were many who could well have been just as entitled to consideration, but the Committee did the best it could in the circumstances.

Well, finally (about two hours before Harry's hair would have turned grey with worry), miraculously the Hercules was ours for the trip.

All this was achieved by your President and Executive for the benefit of members and in the name of our grand unit. However, it was felt that, whilst the V.I.P. list included high-ranking representatives of the Divisions and various organizations some 6 Div. personnel should be included in the Hercules flight.

To this end 15 seats were allocated with 45 for for our members, headed by President Harry. (Actually, there were 68 on the Hercules, including 46 of our members.)

I'm sure all members will join in congratulating and thanking Harry Gjedsted and his co-workers, who, by a tremendous and sustained effort, afforded at least a reasonable number of our members the opportunity to return to Wewak.

CAPE WOM MEMORIAL PARK

Early in 1969, the Wewak Sub-Branch of the Returned Services League commenced plans for "THE RETURN TO WEWAK" and the rebuilding of that area at CAPE WOM where the Japanese Armed Forces in the Sepik area formally signed official documents appertaining to the cessation of hostilities, before Major General H. G. H. Robertson on the 13th September, 1945. These particular plans provided for the overall development of the area into a Parkland and the erection of an imposing base for the existing Memorial, which marks the exact spot where the official documents were signed. This Memorial was erected on the 21st January, 1946.

On the 31st March, 1969, His Honour the Administrator, Mr. David Osborne Hay, C.B.E., D.S.C., by virtue of power conferred by the Land Ordinance of the Territory of Papua New Guinea, reserved an area of approximately 1.9 hectares for the purpose of a Memorial Park, and officially appointed as Trustees—(a) the Officer for the time being holding the position of District Commissioner, East Sepik District; (b) the President of the Wewak Sub-Branch of the Returned Services League (Mr. Danny Barnard) and (c) Mr. James Lindsay Crawford, to control and make by-laws for the carrying out of the objects of the Trust.

The area is now officially known as "THE CAPE WOM MEMORIAL PARK", the road leading into the Park from the WEWAK/DAGUA Road is officially known as "CHOWNE V.C. DRIVE" (both sanctioned by the District Advisory Council and the Place Names Committee, Port Moresby). The entrance to Cape Wom Memorial Park is known as "STEVENS GATE", after Major General E. S. Stevens, G.O.C., Australian Sixth Division from October, 1944, to August, 1945, in the Sepik area. The internal road within the Parkland is known as "ROBERTSON DRIVE", after Major General H. C. H. Robertson, who took over the Division from Major General Stevens and conducted the official ceremonies relating to the cessation of hostilities.

The Trustees, several R.S.L., working Committee, supported by Wewak Service Clubs of ROTARY, APEX, LIONS, BUFFALO LODGE and hundreds of indigenous ex-servicemen and school children and members of the general public carried out the vast preparations, beautification and building of the area; landscaping, based on on-the-spot advice from Mrs. Andree Millar, of the Botanical Gardens, Lae, was effected by the Service Clubs aforesaid, Public Works Department, many town businessmen and Mr. Noel Butler, supervised by the indefatigable President, Danny Barnard. The golden crotons and other plants came from Mrs. Andree Millar and the "traveller palms" from Sheedy's Nursery, Port Moresby.

The coconut palms lining the sides of Robertson Drive represent "Red" Robbie's 3000 troops plus that lined the old pre-war airstrip on the 13th September, 1945. The Yar and Blue Gum trees are "The Silent Sentinels" and the Golden Crotons to the rear of the Memorial are the Living Wreaths to the Fallen

—they will all bloom and grow in the future as surely as Peace Among Men of All Races.

Bronze Remembrance and Honour Plaques will be placed on the Memorial monument for unveiling on the 13th September, 1970. It is anticipated that eventually there will be fountains positioned in the Park; also a Flame of Victory, but more as a Torch of Peace Among Men of All Races.

THE CAPE WOM MEMORIAL PARK will be officially opened at exactly 10?? hours on the morning of Sunday the 13th September, 1970, twenty-five years to the day, to the hour, to the minute of the formal cessation of hostilities in the Sepik area, conducted at CAPE WOM.

The official ceremony and pageantry will be in the presence of Australian, American, Papuan, New Guinean and Japanese Pilgrims and it is hoped a representative from India (Major Chint Singh)—see post), units of the R.A.N—Pacific Islands Regiment —Royal Papuan and New Guinean Constabulary—Papua New Guinea Volunteer Reserve—Brandi High School Cadet Unit and representation from the Royal Australian Air Force. Indigenous ex-servicemen from the Sepik districts, headed by Warrant Officer YAU-WIGA, Distinguished Conduct Medal—Loyal Service Medal, and Sgt. PITA SIMOGUN, British Empire Medal, Loyal Service Medal, will be to the forefront.

The official ceremonies will be to the Fallen of all races (combatant and non-combatant) who paid the supreme sacrifice for Peace; there was racial unity in their sacrifice, let this Memorial forever be a tribute to those men and a lasting symbol of racial unity and Peace.

It may well be asked by the present younger generation, why after 25 years it is considered necessary to commemorate the cessation of hostilities in the Sepik area—reliving, as it were, the stark tragedy of friend and foe and non-combatant who were killed or maimed in battle.

The answer is very simple. If this war had been lost, the younger generation of this country would not perhaps be progressing as they are today in the political, social and economic spheres towards governing their country themselves—the fact that they are so progressing is based on the sacrifices made, which is also the foundation and heritage of the unborn generations of the future.

Words seem inadequate to pay tribute to those who died for this heritage, as words no sooner spoken are lost in memory, thus what these men died for and suffered for should not be forgotten in the annals of history of this country, Australia and America.

If there was no remembrance, no anniversary of the Fallen in a cause for Peace, and the CAPE WOM area overgrown and neglected—then surely those who died would haunt our minds with the words of Wystan Hugh Aunden—

"TO SAVE YOUR WORLD YOU ASKED THIS MAN TO DIE: WOULD THIS MAN, COULD HE SEE YOU NOW — ASK, WHY?"

WAR DIARY (AFTER WEWAK-WIRUI)

War Diary: Lt./Col. Cox: "During the past three months the morale of the men has been very high indeed, the result of repeated successes, vigorous battles and good supply condition. Early in the campaign it was noticeable that many of the troops and officers, too, considered the campaign not worthwhile and consequently morale dropped. At that time, however, there were restrictions on ops. and supply was not of very high standard and, although there were many reasons for this, they were not known or appreciated by the majority of personnel.

"For gallantry during these operations, I have submitted recommendations for one V.C., four M.C.'s, four D.C.M.'s, five M.M. and two M.B.E.'s."

Col. Cox was himself recommended for and awarded the D.S.O. for his skilful planning and handling of the Bn's. attack on Wewak and Wirui Mission.

(The attack on Wirui Mission, involving the Bn. with arty. and tank support, was organised in four hours from the decision to attack to "H" Hour!)
