### VALE FATHER

During the course of our lifetime, we meet people who have an undefinable, and rare quality that endears them to all in some way or another.

They are few, but such a man was Father Henry James Reid, M.S.C., Ph.D., D.D. who came to us in Palestine in 1941 as our Battalion Padre, and within minutes of his arrival became "Paddy" Reid.

In a very short space of time "Paddy" had endeared himself to all ranks and religions with his sincerity, understanding, sense of humour, and his bright and cheerful personality. He was a good friend to so many, and had the esteem, respect and affection of us all.

His unexpected arrival from South Australia, and to our Monthly Meeting on Friday, 3rd September, helped greatly in making that night one of the best that we have had—the delight and pleasure of having him with us was so obviously mutual. "Paddy" was born at Dubbo in 1902; in the progress of his religious following, went to Rome in 1925, where he was ordained in 1927. Following the outbreak of World War II in 1939 "Paddy" served with our Battalion in the Middle East and Darwin, and then went on to serve in New Guinea and the Solomon Islands.

At the end of the War, he was an Honorary Colonel in the Chaplain's branch of the service. When the Korean War broke out, "Paddy" served in Korea with the Australian Forces, and at the time of his death was Honorary Assistant Chaplain General to the Australian Armed Forces.

"Paddy" died on Saturday, 11th September, at Burwood, N.S.W., whilst on a train journeying to Strathfield to be with his sister and relatives, and on Tuesday, 14th September, a Requiem Mass was held for "Paddy" at the Church of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, Avoca Street, Randwick.

In a Church filled to capacity with his many friends, a most impressive, and moving service was given to

One interesting feature of the presentation of trophies was the presentation of an additional trophy to the Regiment. The Trophy was the 4th Bn. (M.) Trophy introduced into that Battalion in 1934 for the most Efficient Section. It had been last won in 1939, and had remained in the hands of the Section Commander until now.

It was presented to **Lieut. Col. T. R. Chambers, E.D.,** C.O. 4 Bn. R.N.S.W.R., by **Lieut. Col. Williams** as an association of 4th Infantry Bns. Trophy to be competed for annually on its original basis of "The most efficient section".

Lieut. Col. Williams was O.C. "A" Coy. 4 Bn. (M.), then 2 I/C, and then commanded the Bn. when Lt. Col. Parsons was posted C.O. 2/4 Aust. Inf. Bn. He was C.O. 2/17 Bn. A.I.F. and after Tobruk was C.O. 2/2 Pioneer Bn. which later went to JAVA. He was taken prisoner when the Japanese overran Java, and worked on the Burma Railway until the end of the war.

#### **OUR PATRON SPEAKS**

On Thursday, 2nd September, 1971, at the invitation of Lieut. Col. T. Chambers E.D., our Patron, Major. Gen. Sir Ivan Dougherty, C.B.E., D.S.O. and Bar, E.D., addressed Officers and N.C.O.'s of 4 Bn. The Royal N.S.W. Regiment at the Regimental Depot, Arneliffe.

The subject of Sir Ivan's address was the campaign in GREECE, 1941, and the 2/4 Infantry Battalion's participation in that campaign.

Sir Ivan outlined the general situation, and the development of the campaign, commencing with the embarkation of the Bn. on the "Pentland" at Alexandria on 1st April, 1941, and the dispersal of the Bn. after disembarking at PIREAUS, Greece. Sir Ivan gave a very concise and detailed description of events leading up to the campaign, and the situations as they developed. He supported his address with Charts and the use of the Blackboard. Emphasis was on the Bn's actions and tactics, the numerous problems and difficulties and lessons learnt from the campaign.

At the conclusion of his address, Sir Ivan invited questions, to which there was an enthusiastic response, following which he, and **your President**, with **Peter Cade**, and **Peter Cook** were afforded the usual very high standard of hospitality that is so characteristic of 4 Bn. R.N.S.W.R.
