'A large crowd watched the Anzac Day Commemorative March in Forbes.

"The crowd lined Lachlan Street to watch the impressive march as it moved towards the cenotaph in Harold Street where the remembrance service was

"Mr. Bernie O'Mara, B.E.M., was guest speaker at the service.

"Mr. O'Mara emphasized how important it was for the youth of today to realise the significance of Anzac. "We ask our youth that, while they are enjoying the standards of living, they stop and ponder the mean-

ing of Anzac.
"This they must do if they are to become success-

ful leaders of the future', Mr. O'Mara said.

'Mr. O'Mara said he felt sure today's youth would find the true meaning of Anzac, 'not a day to glorify war . . . but a day when we give thanks to those who have given us this land we hold so dear'.

"A large crowd surrounded the cenotaph and the

assembled marchers during the service.

"Mr. O'Mara said the most significant thing to him

on Anzac Day was the thoughts of the young.

"He said the young of today were born into a land of complacency when even a flight to the moon hardly made mention in newspapers until it was fraught with danger and men's lives were in jeopardy.

'I feel sure it will only be then that those who have made the supreme sacrifice will rest peacefully knowing that the youth of today will forever champion their cause, for this is their heritage,' Mr. O'Mara con-

cluded."

The July General Meeting also endorsed a committee recommendation to donate from Unit Funds a Special Plaque of much larger dimensions in memory of those Indigenous Papuans and New Guineans who paid the Supreme Sacrifice in the Wewak Campaign. He was killed whilst on a small patrol with me on the day we crossed the Dananap River. A number of C Coy. personnel were killed and wounded the next day.

Dickie Addison was a young Victorian who came to the Bn. from 23/21 Bn.

I leave for overseas with my wife shortly and expect to be away about $3\frac{1}{2}$ months.

Who knows, I might see a familiar face or a White over Green badge somewhere?

MESSAGE FROM MELBOURNE

From Ken Moses, 37 Edinburgh Street, East Bentleigh Dear "Cock",

I am sending you a copy of the paper which helps me support the Government with a considerable amount of tax. On page 28 there is a full page story by me on the **Costa Rica**, the day it hit the streets, being the actual 30th Anniversary of the sinking.

I was down at the club tonight, and it was amazing the number of blokes who came up to me and said that they didn't know I was on the Costa Rica. A few of them were; and quite a few others were on the City of London and Dilwarra. This is just the reaction in one club, so one of the blokes reckoned we should circulate a few other clubs and have a bit of a reunion. Heaven help us.

As I always back the 2/4 doubles, that is No. 2 in the first leg and No. 4 in the second, there was a meeting at Werribee that day, and I reckoned it was a monty that it would get up on such an occasion. So I had a few units on it. Sure enough Stanaswa won the first leg and Rickshaw Lad the second and paid \$12.45 for a 50c unit. I have quite a bit of success with my 2-4 doubles and usually punt a unit each way on the TAB with any horse that was fourth at its last start and was second the start before (e.g. 724 in the form guide).

Rajah Sahib in the Melbourne Cup was a 2/4 and when I found out that the jockey's colours were white and green I had ten units each way and he paid \$19 odd for a win for 50c and \$4 odd for a place. Very handy when my second daughter Jillian is getting married in August.

Can't give you any Anzac Day news as I was wonky at home for a week with a bung knee, with fluid spreading down the leg. Dr. said it could have been caused by any old injury, even back to football days. So no reunions and no march. For the first time in 25 years, my wife Rosemary had a decent birthday as my eldest daughter drove us to a mate of mine who has a hotel-motel in the hills and we had a beaut lunch. Did not even see the march on TV. Claude Raymond rang me the night before and said that Doug Miller was host at the Elwood R.S.L. for any of the boys before the march so I presume there was a gathering.

I hope "Blah" Smith told you the truth about the 34 Manly diggers who were the guests of the Bentleigh Diggers' Swimming Club for a weekend. Although our club had only been formed six weeks, we thrashed them in the three individual events, but they got the seconds and thirds and won the relay, so they took home the perpetual trophies. It all was on a handicap basis. Manly had two one-legged codgers from World War 1, and a bloke near 80—and they all swam. There was a very impressive ceremony before the competition started and I'm enclosing pictures of same. There was quite a good crowd and the kids of the Moorabbin Swimming Pool were amazed at the speed of the old codgers. They were standing by ready to give us mouth to mouth resuscitation. When we finished, their general comment was, "Thank God they are not in our club. We would not have a show." Since then we have been inundated to give exhibitions at quite a few country and metropolitan pools, just to show kids that there is no need to retire from swimming at 17 or 18. The only trouble is that the kids cheer like mad and we

can't keep up with the encores. Our recovery rate is not what it used to be 30 odd years ago and about six 50 metres flat out in the one night is a bit strenuous at 52. But it is good fun and we are doing something for the kids anyway.

The Manly boys were really beaten by hospitality. The Mayor of Moorabbin put on a mayoral reception for an hour, and four hours later both teams departed to the R.S.L.. at Bentleigh, with the Mayor, who reckoned we drank out his mayoral allowance for the year. "Blah" has become a bit of a legend and his stories are still being told time and again around the City of Moorabbin. After the event there was another 7 hour "ding" and we poured them on to the train, and from what I can make out, all but one failed to return to work, and he did not make it until mid-day. The rest made for Manly and spent the day cracking the waves off Bluefish Point and drying out until it was time to retire, rather early I believe, to the Manly Hotel.

Have written too much already "Cock". Keep up the good work and hope to see you at Wagga, if there is any petty cash after the wedding. Cheers to all the boys and love to Eileen at the North British.
