

Yarapos Girls High School, Wewak, New Guinea.


Dear Mr. Gjedsted,

I would like to thank you and all the men of the 2/4th Association for your help in getting me to High School.

I am 13 years of age. I went to St. Mary's School last year. Now I'm in Yarapos High School. Yarapos is quite a big school with two hundred and fifty girls. There are some day girls—about fifty of them. I like my new school because its the wonderful school in the East Sepik District. My hobbies are swimming, dancing and fishing. The subjects which I like best are Commerce, English, Maths and Home Science. The teachers and the students at my new school are very

In my family there are seven people. They are my father, my mother, my two elder brothers and four small ones. We are all in school except the last girl. My father works as a cooky in the D.C.A. mess.

I wrote this letter when I was with Mr. and Mrs.

Smith in their home. They went to my school and picked up Philomena and myself to spend a Sunday with them. They took us for a swim at Moem Barracks. After our swim at Moem Barracks we had a ride to Brandi where the two boys are. We went right out to a village called Madi, and on our way back to where Mr. & Mrs. Smith are living we met Joseph Kumasi. After a short talking to him we drove on to Mr. Smith's place. From there on we started writing our letters to you.

So once again I would like to thank you Mr. Gjedsted and the other members of 2/4th Association a thousand times for paying my school fees.

That's all I've got to tell you because it's nearly time to go back to school.

St. Xavier's High School Kairiru Island, Wewak. New Guinea.

Dear Mr. MacLennan.

I would like to thank you for sending me to school at St. Xavier's High. I am very happy now with my schoolwork. My school is right on the Island of Kairiru about eighteen miles out of Wewak town. In school my favourite subjects are English, Science, Maths and Social Science. Sports I like are volley ball, soccer and basketball.

My age is about fifteen. I came from the village which is called Makopin and my Mission Station is called Dagua, which is out of Wewak about thirty-five miles. My village is about three miles from the sea. Also the Mission Station is right on the beach. There is where I attended my Primary School. Sister Domenique was our Headmaster and also she comes from Australia, in New South Wales.

The people in my area are very helpful people but a very few of them sometimes disobeyed the laws of Government. My village is just on the bottom of the mountains but not really on the bottom-somewhere about seven miles away.

My brothers own a plantation of coconut palms of ten acres. Every four months they make copra of ten bags. Six dollars to ten dollars they receive for each

bag. Prices of copra always go and down.

Both of my parents are dead and we are looked after by our eldest brothers. Last year two mothers died and only one was left. First mother had three sons, that's myself and two of my eldest brothers. Second mother had three and the third one have two and the last one with none. My father was a chief man in the village.

The island I'm in is volcanic island but it doesn't erupt. The water which is boiling comes out of the side of the island. That's why it doesn't erupt. It

always sleeps.

Dear Mr. & Mrs. MacLennan,

I would like to thank you for help in sending me into High School.

I am thirteen years of age and five feet tall. I was at Holy Rosary School last year and now I am in Yarapos High School.

Yarapos is quite a big school. There are 290 girls in Yarapos High School—there are two dormitories and about a hundred girls in each dormitory and the others are day scholars.

We learn many lessons at school and also we have a lot of teachers. Most of our teachers are Mercy Sisters. My favourite subject is Science because we learn much about our own world.

My family lives at But. I have three brothers and one sister and I am the youngest in our family.

At school we play sports and I usually play basket-ball. I have been picked in the team of Yarapos girls basketball players to go and play in Wewak against their team. Our sport uniform is yellow.

One Sunday Mr. and Mrs. Smith came to Yarapos and took Antonia and myself to their house. At their house we had some cold drinks and lunch. And after that we went straight to Moem beach to have a swim. After swim Mr. Smith drove us to Brandi and then back again.

At five o'clock we had our tea and then he drove us back to Yarapos. I really enjoyed myself very much.

# WEWAK NIGHT

Friday September 3rd — the night of our September Meeting — has been designated our first **Wewak Night.** Following our successful venture to Wewak last year when a contingent of 45 Association members attended the ceremony at Cape Wom commemorating the 25th Anniversary of the Japanese Surrender, it was decided that the September monthly meeting would in future be known as **Wewak Night.** 

It is fully expected that all members particularly those who took part in that wonderful pilgrimage to the scene of their victory 25 years before, will be present at Royal Naval House on September 3rd. Formal business will be kept to a minimum. The night will be devoted mostly to Wewak affairs. It is anticipated that two or perhaps three indigenous members of the Papua New Guinea Education Department will be in attendance.

Since the visit to Wewak last year the Association has made some important decisions, not the least among them being the creation of the 2/4th Battalion Association Scholarship Scheme for the education of children of that area. A report on the Scholarship scheme appeared in the Wewak paper "Wantok". The article is repeated elsewhere in this issue together with an English translation kindly made available by Mrs. Helen Smith whose husband Ern is chairman of the Scholarship Committee in Wewak.

Another decision made since the visit to Wewak was to supply memorial plaques to honour those of our battalion who paid the supreme sacrifice in Papua New Guinea during the war. Association members have already subscribed for 42 plaques—it is hoped that the 13 plaques still required will be spoken for by Wewak night. The cost is \$3.50 each and donations may be made to our Treasurer Allen Lindsay whose address is on the front page.

In addition to those for our own members the Association has provided a much larger plaque for placement on the Cape Wom Memorial Monument in honour of those Indigenes who served their country, and ours, so valiantly. It is hoped to have this plaque available on **Wewak Night.** 

May we repeat that it is expected that all those who were privileged to make the trip to Wewak last September are expected to attend this inaugural Wewak Night.

# WAGGA WAGGA

The date is 23rd October, 1939, the place is Wagga Wagga, where 17 Bods are being driven down Bayliss Street in various cars to where, at the Railway Station, a crowd of 1,000 people, plus dignitaries and the Salvation Army Band, wait to give them a send-off as we (the Bods) board the train for Sydney. A number of these Bods wont be here to attend the Reunion this year, some are buried in the M.E. and other theatres of war, some have just passed on, but we shall remember them!

We, in 1939, boarded the train and at every major station, to around about Goulburn, were joined by other parties in various stages of exultation and most of us had no sleep that night. Many others from around the Riverina who had been in camp as members of the 56th Battalion, came down later but we were the first Riverina Rookies to be marched into Liverpool Camp, by Cootamundra's **Lieut. Conkey.** The more veteran "Soldiers of a few days" greeted us with cries of "You'll be sorry" as we passed their huts.

These days and many others will be brought to mind by the boys of the good old Battalion when we meet at Wagga on the long weekend in October. Wagga Wagga will be proud to entertain you, for it is one of the towns which is proud of its honour in providing so many of the original boys to help form the Battalion on 3rd November, 1939. Remember the days at Julis L4, where we decorated the areas around our tents. Our tent in Don Coy. lines held a (supposedly) Wagga Coat of Arms which I made in a very amateur fashion, the birds of the emblem looking more like magpies than crows.

You who came down in 1960 for the first Wagga Reunion will find that the city has grown considerably since then and more particularly in the newer areas around and south of Willons Hill. You will see some lovely gardens and attractive suburbs. The Australia Hotel where we then congregated is no more and in its place is a modern building, shopping centre and arcade.

We hope that our visitors will return home with pleasant memories of a pleasant town and of a very successful reunion. I am glad to hear that **Paddy Reid** is coming over from Adelaide, this will be his second visit to Wagga at a reunion. We country folk are really looking forward to meeting all the old mates of the cities and other country areas and, don't forget, there is no crowd like a 2/4th crowd! I think that for most of us who served with 2/4 Battalion it was the greatest experience of our lives and one we are glad to have happened. We who are here still are very fortunate people.

So, roll up all you WOGS and bring your wives if you can and help us to make it one of the "best ever" Country Reunions!
