To you all I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation for the support and encouragement that you have given me and the committee throughout the year.

Our financial situation is sound and growing stronger, thanks to our Hon. Treasurer, Allen Lindsay, our planned budgeting, the success of our Canberra reunion, the generous donations of wines and spirits by our Senior Vice-President Bill MacLennan, and the many donations made by members, families and friends, including the beautifully mounted Gibraltar Crown pendant, donated by Monty Siems, and won by Enid Latimer on Patron and Ladies' Night. Monty has sent me another pendant equally as beautiful, to be raffled in 1973.

Secretary Dick Morris and our committee team, and on your behalf I extend to them our sincere thanks and appreciation for all they have done, and are doing to ensure that all our activities and responsibilities are maintained at the highest standards.

Highlights of our activities during 1972 were:

1. The conferring of Honorary Life Membership on Harry Wright for his service to our Association.

2. Anzac Day — a clear sunny day, well attended, the pride and comradeship that is so strong within our Association reflected in the appearance and bearing of our men on parade, and the atmosphere at our Reunion Luncheon.

3. Patron's and Ladies' Night — a most enjoyable and well attended social function in the company of our Patron Sir Ivan and Lady Dougherty and the wives, families and friends of our members.

4. The Canberra Reunion — another outstanding success in every way, and again our sincere thanks to the Canberra Committee and all concerned for all that was done to ensure success, and to all those who came from near and far to join us.

5. The 2/4th Aust. Inf. Bn. Assn. Marksmanship Trophy for inter-company competition in 4 Bn. R.N.S.W.Regt. and won this year, for the first time, by "C" Coy. Our congratulations to all ranks.

6. The Annual November Remembrance Day March

& Wreath Laying Ceremony of the Association of 4th Infantry Battalions.

- 7. The election of our Hon. Treasurer Allen Lindsay and committeeman Ted Fox to directorships of the Gallipoli Memorial Club. Allen's and Ted's appointments should and must give us all a greater interest in the affairs and future development of "our Club", and again I appeal to our members to join this Club which has become the home of our Association. The original and older members of the Club, have appealed to us "younger" men to take over the responsibilities of the Club, so let's do our share in the true spirit of ANZAC. Start your 1973 correspondence by writing to us for an application form you'll have it back by return mail.
- 8. The production of our Association Plaque. From several designs by Dick Morris and Peter Cade, a final decision was made, and I took the design with me to London for costing, production, etc. The London firm of C. H. Munday are specialists in the field of Heraldry and Regimental Wall Shields and other than a minor alteration to "balance" the layout, the design is originally ours. So in 1973 we will have Association Plaques of our design, and which you will be very proud to possess. Details of availability and cost will be advised as soon as possible.
- 9. The presentation to our Association of the **Tobruk Flag** by the president of Hurstville Sub-branch,
 R.S.L., which we plan to have displayed in the
 Gallipoli Memorial Club.

Being with Marge and in the company of Sir Ivan and Lady Dougherty in Greece and Crete was a wonderful and unforgettable experience — the kindness, courtesies and hospitality extended to us during our visit will always be remembered. At the reception given us at Heraklion Sir Ivan presented our Association Memorial Plaque to the Mayor, General Aristides Petrakis, and was in turn presented with a Medallion by the Mayor (details of the plaques were given in the July issue of WOG). From Heraklion we went by car through Retimo, Suda Bay, Canea, to Malame airstrip where we were given another Civic Reception, Sir Ivan, Major G. Corey and I being presented with a Medallion and Scroll.

During a description of the battle for Malame airstrip, given by the Commander of the Greek Forces, Suda Bay, some earth was disturbed near Sir Ivan and a German paratrooper's helmet revealed. (Sir Ivan later handed the helmet to the Australian Embassy in Athens, and on contacting the Embassy on our way home in Sept., I was informed that arrangements had been made to send the helmet back to the Australian War Memorial Museum in Canberra).

We visited the British Commonwealth War Cemetery at Suda Bay where all the men of the A.I.F. who were killed on Crete are buried, or their names recorded. Like all British Commonwealth War Cemeteries throughout the world, it is beautifully sited and maintained. Sir Ivan & Lady Dougherty with Marge and myself took a 6 day tour of northern Greece. In the relatively short time available this was the only way we could see some of the places where the Battalion fought in 1941. The tour took us through Levadia, Bralos Pass, Lamia, Domokos, Larissa, but unfortun-

ately not near Elasson, Servia, Kozani or Vevi. Instead we went up the coast road to the Island of Thassos, via Thessalonika.

The countryside is beautiful as ever and we stopped the bus at Bralos Pass while we stood, looked and remembered. It was here in 1941 that 6 Aust. Div. A.I.F. and the N.Z.E.F. were formed into an Anzac Corps, the second time in history that A.I.F. and N.Z. troops were so designated. There is little or no change in these places, some road widening at Bralos, but other than that, just the same as we knew it.

We said good-bye to Sir Ivan and Lady Dougherty in Athens — we were going our separate ways to Europe and the U.K. (2 days later we "bumped" into Sir Ivan in Constitution Square in Athens, as we were racing to catch our bus to Patras — 3 weeks later we met again at the Tourist Information Centre at Heidelbery, Germany, and travelled up the Rhine together the next day!)

Our but to Patras took us through Daphni and Megara. On our way back home in September we stayed 2 weeks in Athens, attended the Wine Festival at Daphni (just the same as we saw it — pine and gum trees) and saw the Greek folk dancing, and the "Sound and Light" theatre at the Acropolis — wonderful experience. On this return trip, and by arrangement with the Australian Embassy, I presented our second Memorial Plaque to Lieut.-General Mourikis, Deputy Commander of the Supreme Hellenic Armed Forces, representing the Prime Minister, in his absence.

General Mourikis, a Lieutenant in the Greek Army fighting the Italians in Albania in 1940-41, was most impressed with our Plaque, and on behalf of the Greek Government and people, expressed his sincere thanks and appreciation to our Association. We visited the British Commonwealth War Cemetery at Phaleron, which faces the sea and is halfway between Athens and the Airport. The names of all those who gave their lives in Greece are inscribed on rectangular, polished marble Memorial Panels, 15 feet high and recorded by units. 6 Aust. Div. A.I.F. is inscribed by the units, with Infantry Battalions in numerical sequence. Mr. Steve Brady, War Graves Commissioner for Europe and Middle East is having a photograph taken for me which we will reproduce in W.O.G.

It would take a book to describe the beauty of Greece, its Islands, Europe and the U.K., the many interesting places we saw, the experiences we had, and the friendliness of the people everywhere we went, but some of the many things we did were:

To visit my father's grave in the British Commonwealth War Cemetery at Grevillers, France, between Bullecourt and Bapaume. (My father enlisted in the 1st Bn. A.I.F. — was seriously wounded at Lone Pine, Gallipoli, repatriated back to Australia, and after recovering rejoined his Battalion in France and was killed at Bullecourt on 6 May, 1917.)

To visit Dachau, the British Airborne Museum and Cemetery at Arnhem, and the Danish Resistance Museum at Copenhagen. The Resistance Museum includes the decorations awarded to Captain Olaf Larsen, of the Royal Danish Army, who fought the German Invasion of Denmark, escaped to England and joined the Free Danish Army — fought in North Africa — parachuted into Denmark to join the Danish Resistance, and was killed in action. In addition to numerous awards

and decorations he won the Victoria Cross (Posthumously) D.S.O. and Bar, M.C. and Two Bars. He is the only non-member of the British Empire and Commonwealth to be awarded the Victoria Cross.

To meet, in Vienna, Walter Konneink, ex-German Paratrooper, a member of Max Schmellings group who dropped at Malame, Crete, later fought in North Africa, was captured by the Kiwis, and spent the rest of the

War in a P.O.W. Camp in South Africa.

The U.K. — its beauty and traditions — the Changing of the Guard at Buckingham Palace, The Horse Guards Parade, the Tower and the Yeomen of the Guard, the Royal Tournament, St. Paul's and Westminster Cathedral, the Royal Hospital, Chelsea (Chelsea Pensioners), and its Museum, which has the largest collection of awards, decorations and campaign medals in the world. Scotland, Edinburgh Castle, Loch Lomond and the beauty of the Trossach Country; Portsmouth, Sandhurst, and to meet Monty Siems, who looks remarkably well and sends his regards and best wishes to all. So much to see and do, but the highlight of our visit in the U.K. was for Marge and me to be the guests of the Regiment at Goodwood Races, in the beautiful Sussex Downs countryside. The course is traditionally a Royal Sussex Regiment course — the course and horse racing was established on Goodwood, the estate of the third Duke of Richmond, by the Duke, who commanded the 3rd Sussex Militia Battalion in 1782. The Regiment has its own enclosure and Club, including dining and bar facilities, and it was a wonderful experience to be in the company of so many of my old friends again.

And so the year has gone, and, as always, it brought its share of sadness, and in sharing the sad loss of our comrades with families, we also share the distress and anxieties caused by sickness and accident to our members, families and friends, and extend to them our sincere best wishes that the New Year brings comfort and

a speedy return to good health.

To you all, and your families, to the next of kin of members, to our many friends and supporters, to the C.O.'s, officers and men of 4 R.N.S.W.R. and 4 R.A.R. and the members and families of the Association of 4th Infantry Battalions, I send you, from Marge and myself and our family, our best wishes for Good Health, Good Luck, Prosperity and Happiness in 1973.
