#### **OUR LUCKY DAY**

(Excerpt from our War History "White Over Green")
On August 22 Lieutenant-Colonel I. N. Dougherty
assumed command of the battalion, and the unit was
formally handed over to him by the Commander, 19th
Infantry Brigade, Brigadier H. C. H. Robertson.
Lieutenant-Colonel P. J. McCormack, who had commanded the battalion while it was "X" Regiment, bade
the unit farewell, and the brigadier, in welcoming the
unit back to the brigade spoke of the excellent work
which it had done in Haifa and Acre.

The new commanding officer was an unknown quantity to most of the officers and men. Some knew that he was a schoolteacher, others knew that he had come over originally with the 2/2nd Battalion where he was already highly esteemed. Few knew that he had forsaken the higher rank of lieutenant-colonel in order to sail with the 2/2nd Battalion with the rank of major. There was a quiet, almost boyish demeanour in this man. He had achieved the rank of lieutenant-colonel in the militia at the unusually early age of 32, and here he was, now 33, facing a situation which might well have daunted lesser men. He was probably the youngest commanding officer in the A.I.F. But he had confidence in the battalion, and in turn, the battalion accepted him immediately as a man of ability, honour, integrity, astute in judgment, fair in outlook, firm in resolve. He was to prove all these qualities, and more, as the unit emerged from its passive role of training and security, its momentary experience of active defence, to this new phase of preparation for action.

#### AMENITY

Thanks to **Peter Denver** our South Australian Vice-President for this condensation of a letter to the Mildura T.P.I. Sub-Branch by **K. Pendrill:** 

"One available amenity to ex-servicemen is not generally known. This is the P.O.W. Trust Fund, consisting of a large sum of money. Converted from seized German assets, to be used solely for the distribution to service personnel who were in P.O.W. camps in Germany between '39-45.

Over the years this fund has been increasing, as the interest mounts up, and the claims upon it are few. In my opinion the reason for the paucity of claims is that the majority of ex-P.O.W.'s have not been informed of the existence of the fund. I found out about it entirely by chance. Since then several of my members as well as myself have received grants for various reasons. To quote a few of the largest: "\$500 to pay off a car; \$300 for a member's holiday after hospitalisation; \$160 for roof repairs to a house; \$250 for holiday—and many smaller amounts. Personally I have received \$250 for a holiday two years ago and a further \$60 this year for reasons unstated.

I would strongly advise any members, ex-P.O.W.'s Germany '39-'45, to apply for an application form to the Secretary, P.O.W. Trust Fund, Box 63A, G.P.O. Melbourne. The officers of the trust only meet at lengthy intervals and it may take a couple of months for your application to be considered." Peter adds: "Let's hope this avenue will help somebody. Maybe a Mercedes ride to the Gallipoli Club for Athol Heath or a holiday to South Aust. for Eric Gumbleton (who I'd love to see again. especially at the expense of Lord Haw Haw, Adolph & Co.)."
