GALLIPOLI MISSION R.S.L. Holiday Tour

In March this year R.S.L. National Travel Officer sent out a Bulletin to gauge possible interest in a tour to the Middle East and Gallipoli.

The 25th April, 1975, the 60th Anniversary of the first Anzac Day, would be spent at Gallipoli with suitable ceremonies.

The response has been encouraging and planning has reached the stage to start costing the tour. It is proposed to charter a Boeing from Sydney to Cairo for a five day visit, then to Athens (8 days), Israel (8 days), Lebanon (5 days), Istanbul (3 days) and Anzac Cove (2 days).

A full day will be spent at Alamein, with a quick "shoofti" at Tek el Aisa. The Greek sector will be highlighted by an organised "evacuation" from Kalamata. The old haunts in Palestine such as Jaffa, Kilo 89, Tel Aviv, the Hotel Fast, the new-look Western Wall will be visited again, plus places that weren't there in 1940.

Beirut, The Dog River, Balbek and Tripoli are on the list for the Lebanese visit.

In Istanbul it will be bazaars and belly dancers, Mosques and monuments before the tour goes to Anzac Cove, Lone Pine, Shrapnel Gully, Quinn's Post and Ari Burnu.
