MOUNT LOFTY MEMORIES REVIVED

The following item from "Army" will bring back to many memories of our sojourn at Mount Lofty, when we were fortunate enough to have nearby at Arthur's Seat", a fine group of girls of the AWAS.

I could be wrong, but was it not Miss Douglas who was O.I.C. of that group?

"In Adelaide, former soldiers of the Australian Women's Army Service — AWAS — the forerunner of today's WRAAC, organised a memorial in honour of Col. Sybil Irving, who died last year.

Col. Irving was the Controller of AWAS between 1941-46 and Honorary Colonel of the WRAAC, 1956-61.

A plaque, which was mounted on a park seat, was unveiled by Miss May Douglas, first Commandant of the AWAS in South Australia.

The Army was represented by a former Deputy CGS, Maj.-Gen. R. N. L. Hopkins; the Commander 9 TF, Brig. I. S. Barr, and the Commander, 4 MD, Lt.-Col. Robin Hone.

Representing the WRAAC were Maj. C. Cruikshank and Capt. J. Melton."

Well-known W.O.G. Tom Watson was accorded quite an article in "Army" newspaper, including a photo of his 48 ft. "retirement cruiser", "Coaster".

"A man who met every R & R flight from SVN in Sydney for six years, is now getting some fulltime R &

R himself.

He is Sgt. Tom Watson, of 2MDPD, who leaves the Army on May 16, after 31 years' service.

Sgt. Watson has gone into the charter boat business

out of Palm Beach, Sydney.

"I've always had a line in my hip pocket, so the fishing boat business seemed to be a natural to fill in my time after discharge," he said.
"One thing I'll really miss when I leave the Army

will be the companionship.

"I hope this project will fill the gap," he told ARMY's Capt. Ian Edwardson.
