ANZAC DIAMOND JUBILEE The following Editorial from Rooty Hill R.S.L. Club's "Courier" is a good summary of what should be said of this important Anniversary, Anzac Day.

As most of our R.S.L. members realise the coming Anzac Day will mark the Diamond Jubilee of the Landing of the Australian New Zealand Army Corps at Gallipoli on that famous and glorious day of April 25th, 1915.

To our younger generation who may not realise the significance of this day on Friday, 25th April, 1975, we would like then to comprehend the importance of this day, particularly to our surviving ANZACs, as it could well be that it is the last ten year anniversary for many of them.

The tradition of Anzac is a vital part of our national heritage. We owe a great deal to our original Anzacs because they established standards of courage and tenacity for all Australians to follow. We mustn't lose this real and tangible tradition that we Aussies have and respect, as it is a part of our Australian way of life and it could possibly be the life blood of our younger generation and of our young country.

No decent living Aussie would knock tradition knowing full well that he would not be respected if this eventuated.

Just for the record, and to refresh memories, some 7,600 Aussies were killed and 19,000 were wounded during the eight months of fighting at Gallipoli.

Almost 100,000 young Australians have died in wars this century which were fought to preserve our Australian way of life.

They went to war because they were asked to do a duty — they volunteered — and they lost their lives and died in battle to preserve this great heritage and way of life so that their families and friends could be free and live in peace.

We will not glorify war, but march in solemn tribute to those Australians who died in defence of this country, when we assemble and march on this Anzac Day.

We, their friends and comrades in arms, will never forget these heroic men and their deeds.

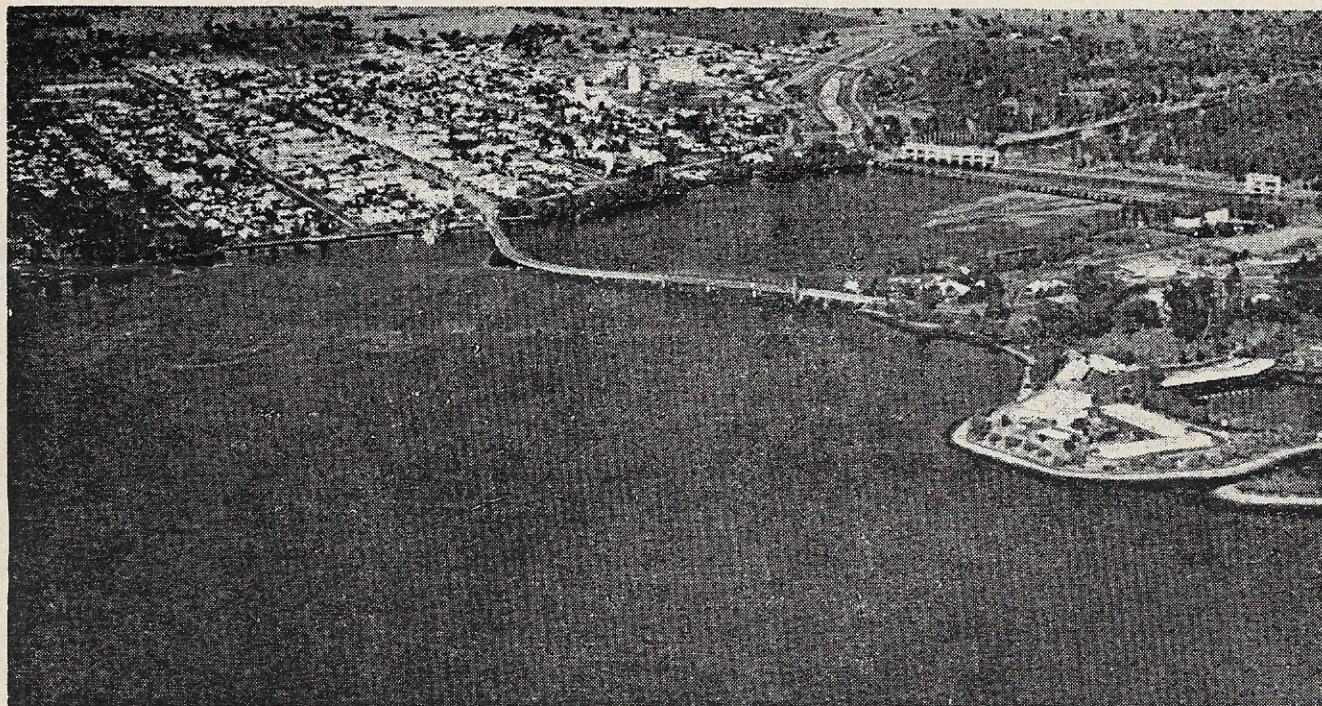

Extracts from the Canberra Times, 11th March

Mr. Jack Bryden Wells, 55 of Lyons, died at his home on Saturday morning. Mr. Wells a retired Australian Army Colnel, had lived in Canberra since 1958, and was born in Wollongong in July 1919. He was educated at Wollongong High School. He was enlisted in the Army in 1939 and served in Greece, Crete and the Middle East during World War II. He also served in the Korean War and was made an MBE for services to his battalion there. Mr. Wells suffered damage to his feet while taking part in a paratrooper's course in 1960, and as a result had both legs amputated in later yrs.
