Wreath Laying Ceremony

F.U.P. - corner York and Erskine Sts. time 0.730 hours.

Anzac Day March -

Dick FAULDER was laid to rest on Tuesday, 9th March, 1976, in the presence of a large gathering of family, friends, 2/4 Bn. and Ryde R.S.L., the service being conducted by Rev. W. McLeod, Chaplain of Ryde R.S.L. John COPLAND and Ron TUTTLEBEE (Ryde R.S.L.) took appropriate parts in the ceremony.

Ever since the war Dick has had a long battle against illness and pain, but bore everything with tremendous courage. He and his brother Jim were original members of "B" Coy. and Dick was mentioned in Despatches for brave service in Greece and Crete. He took part in the first Libyan campaign, through Greece, Crete, Darwin and New Guinea with Distinction.

After the war Dick kept active in Welfare work, until recently being assistant welfare

officer of our Association and a Director of the Gallipoli Memorial Club, amongst other positions.

To Shirley, his wife, and other members of his family go our most sincere sympathy.

Farewell Dick, a brave and gallant friend, we were proud to know him.

The Late Sir Mellis NAPIER

Members of the Battalion, especially those of "C" Coy. who were billetted on Mount Lofty in the home of Sir Mellis and Lady Napier on our return to Australia will be saddened to know he died on March 22nd. He was 93, a former Lieutenant Governor and Chief Justice of South Australia and was accorded a State funeral. He served a record term of 43 years on the S.A. Supreme Court Bench, a length of service unequalled in the Commonwealth.

Cec Chrystal called and saw him during his tour in preparing the War History shortly after Lady Napier died, and sent him a copy of the History. He later received an extremely complimentary and gratifying reply from Sir Mellis.

The article in the Herald quoted the Premier, Mr. Dunstan, as saying "South Australia had lost a very distinguished citizen."

NEWS FROM WEWAK

Wal TAYLOR of Cootamundra, who recently visited New Guinea, writes to President Harry as follows:-

"As promised I am writing this to tell you how things are in Wewak. Due to the change over to independence most of the Europeans who had anything to do with the R.S.L. have gone from N.G. It would appear that papers were handed over and were just left as they were on the table with the result nothing was done. It would seem that this is what has happened as far as the fund the Association was running is concerned. To my knowledge there is only one man who had anything to do with the R.S.L. left and he is in bad health and not likely to stay long in Wewak.

"I stayed in Goroka with my son, and whilst there I met up with an old 2/4 man by name "Sparrow" Clinton. He was, I think, from "C" Coy. He sends his regards to all his old mates. He is doing well- has spent most of his time in N.G., where he took his discharge. Also Joe Berger of Wewak, who is now the manager of Burns Philp store there, sends regards to members of the 2/4th and in particular to Dick Morris, who I believe stayed with Joe.

"Joe took us around to Wom Point where the park is. This park is well kept and all the palm trees with the plates of the men's names, numbers, etc., are all in good condition. This park is now kept by the Parks & Wildlife of New Guinea, as there is no longer any R.S.L. Joe also took us up to Mission Hill which is now the area used for Boys Town where youths who have run into trouble are taken care of by the Catholic Mission. The Japanese War Memorial is kept in good order by the Mission as well as visiting crews off Jap ships.

"I hope this will be of some interest and hope I can see you all some time in the future. Regards to all the Association members."

"In the invasion of Greece in 1941, the Libstandart captured some men of the 2/4 Battalion A.I.F. These Australians were the first the SS had seen - the comment "They do not behave like the cold English except in their arrogance and this is more external. They do not seem to be as well disciplined as the English, nor do they wear their uniform as a soldier should."

From which I gather that good judgement was not one of the essential qualifications for admittance to the select ranks of Hitler's SS troops. My friend Cliff Smith was associated with many 2/4 Bn. men and wondered if any would remember this incident."
