Our Patron is Honoured Again.

At Sydney University, at 11.30 a.m. 15th May, 1976, in an atmosphere of colour, dignity and history, our Patron, Major General Sir Ivan Dougherty C.B.E. D.S.O. and Bar, .D. E.D. B.Ec. was conferred with the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws. In the Great Hall of the University Sir Ivan was presented to an audience comprising 240 Graduates of the Faculty of Economics and distinguished guests together with the families and friends of Sir Ivan and the Graduates, by Professor B.R. Williams, Vice Chancellor and Principal of the Faculty of Law. Professor Williams outlined Sir Ivan's life in detail, following which - to prolonged acclamation -Sir Ivan received his Honorary Degree from the Chancellor of the University of Sydney, Sir Hermann Black.

Sir Ivan, we are proud and delighted to see this further recognition of the service you

have given to our country and our people, and extend to you our sincere and warmest congratulations on the conferring of this Honour.

A copy of our War History, suitably inscribed, together with an Association plaque, was presented to the Consul-General for Greece

Mr. G. Constantis by Sir Ivan, following which I made a similar presentation to the President of the Cretan Association, Mr. S. Kotsifakis, Cretan dancers in their traditional dress, ample refreshments and much "getting together", made this a wonderful and memorable occasion, which I am sure will be followed by many more.
