THE 1977 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting of the 2/4th fantry Bn. Association was held at the allipoli Memorial Club on Friday, Feb. 25th; the meeting opened at 2015 hours - Harry Gjedsted in the chair. Correspondence Finance, Welfare and General Business of the Association was conducted expediently, having been dealt with in detail at the Committee Meeting held prior to the A.G.M.

With our Patron, Sir Ivan, acting as RETURNING OFFICER, all offices were declared vacant. Sir Ivan then called for nominations for office for the ensuing twelve months, with the following results:-

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT: Bill MacLENNAN - elected unopposed.

INTERSTATE, COUNTRY & NEWCASTLE VICE-PRESIDENTS: elected unopposed.

TREASURER: Allen LINDSAY - elected unopposed.

SECRETARY: Athol HEATH -elected unopposed.

ASS.SECRETARY: John MEEHAN- elected unopposed. WELFARE OFFICERS: John COPLAND and Bill PARRY elected unopposed.

EDITOR: Bill MacLENNAN - elected unopposed.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS: Cec CHRYSTAL, Ted FOX, Ken
KESTEVEN, Peter CADE, Harold BOWMAN, George
STACK and Mick GRAY.

Dick MORRIS was nominated, but declined due to pressure of work at Sydney Technical College. Harry WRIGHT was nominated, but declined because of his planned overseas trip with Hilda which will take six months, beginning in April. President Harry thanked both Dick and Harry for their contribution to the Association over a period of many years, with the hope that they will both return to the Committee in due course.

LIFE MEMBERSHIPS have always been announced at the A.G.M. and the Award presented on ANZAC DAY. The nomination for this year was for Bill MacLENNAN, whose work and dedicated service to our Association is known to all.

Bill's nomination, accepted and approved unanimously by Committee, was ratified at this Meeting with acclamation, and as Bill will be overseas on Anzac Day President Harry called on Sir Ivan to make the presentation on the spot. The presentation was greeted with sustained applause, and with some emotion Bill thanked the Association for the honour conferred on him. In his response Bill indicated that he and Gwen were leaving at the end of March to attend the first ever International Gathering in Scotland of all Scottish Clans. Allen LINDSAY immediately volunteered the services of himself and Gloria to look after the production of "W.O.G.", in the absence of Bill and Gwen. It will be remembered that Allen and Gloria did this on the previous occasion that Bill and Gwen were overseas.

The President thanked the outgoing Committee and the Members for their support during the year and welcomed the new members to the Committee team.

The fact that only 25 members attended the meeting was disappointing, but nevertheless a very happy and convivial evening was enjoyed by all who did attend.

LEGION OF FRONTIERSMEN OF THE COMMONWEALTH

This is an ancient ex-service organisation, slanted towards explorers, adventurers and men who have served in the out-posts or frontiers of Empire, and was originally raised in 1904 from members who fought in the Boer War. Early members were leading citizens of their time, including such personalities as Winston Churchill, the Earl of Lonsdale, His Serene Highness Prince Louis of Battenberg, Conan Doyle, Rider Haggard, and virtually every wellknown soldier and sportsman of the day. It was a great success in the U.K. and from there started up in Canada, N.Z., and was raised in Australia in 1907. The aims behind the original movement included serving the Empire in time of stress - in wars, etc., and assisting the Government to form units for any expeditionary force, and because of the wide and varied experience of its members could be nothing but an asset to any Government in time of emergency.

During W.W.I the Legion offered its services to the British War Office to form units for active service and to relieve serving soldiers of certain garrison duties in England, e.g. horse breaking, riding instruction, guard duties at vulnerable points etc. The War Office were a bit slow to accept and one group, at their own expense, went off to Belgium and joined the 3rd Belgian Lancers. They were, in fact, the first British troops under fire in that war - even before the Old Contemptibles at Mons. Some little time later the War Office accepted the offer of the Legion and asked them to raise a battalion for service in East Africa. This was done, and the Battalion was known as the 25th Bn. Royal Fusilier (Frontiersmen). An Australian named Dartnell who served with

this unit gained a posthumous V.C.

The Legion remained active in the U.K. and New Zealand, but died in Australia at the outbreak of W.W.2 when most members enlisted in the A.I.F. A group of enthusiasts have now got the movement in Australia active again and currently has over 200 members. The unit will be restricted to social and ceremonial activities - assisting at parades, etc., but should war ever break out would be ready to offer itself for the formation of Home Guard units or perform any other duty requested of it by the Government or the Army.

Mick GRAY has been appointed the Australian Commandant of the Legion by U.K. Headquarters Bill MacLENNAN has been appointed an Officer of the Legion, as has Harry GJEDSTED. Bill's job will be to raise the first Squadron, to be known as the Gallipoli Squadron - Harry will most likely find himself Commander of the NSW The Corps turns out in uniform on ceremonial occasions (those who wish to). Instead of the normal civilian organisation of clubs or groups, the Legion adheres to the army procedure and forms troops or squadrons. Anyone who is interested in joining this organisation - and Mick GRAY would like to see some of our old Battalion interested - should ring him any evening on 997 6011. Incidentally, he will be going to England with four frontiersmen in May to join the British and Canadian contingents on their annual pilgrimage to Belgium. Bill MacLENNAN will be meeting up with Mick over there and accompanying him.
