# ASSOCIATION OF 4TH INF. BNS. ANNIVERSARY CHURCH PARADE

St. Anne's Church of England, Strathfield, the Garrison Church of the 4th Infantry Battalions was once again fairly well attended on Sunday afternoon June 26, 1977 for the Annual Service to Commemorate the laying up of the Queen's

Regimental Colours of the Battalion there on March 14th, 1971.

Prior to the Service, conducted as usual by the Rector of St. Anne's the Rev. Angus Tipping (Chaplain of the Association), a short march to the Church was held behind the Band of the 4th R.N.S.W.R., which also took part in the service which followed. The lessons were read by Sir Ivan Dougherty and Col. Vin Hallinan, Patron and President of the Association respectively, and the message of the Rev. Tipping's address was entitled "Remembrance, Thanksgiving, Dedication". We were once again grateful to Mrs. Tipping and the members of St. Anne's Ladies' Guild for the very enjoyable afternoon tea served in the Church Hall after the service, giving everyone the opportunity of "catching up" socially. Apart from Sir Ivan, 2/4ers present included John Copland, Bill Parry, Ken Kesteven, Allen & Gloria Lindsay and Bill & Gwen MacLennan. It is intended to give more publicity to the approach of this important event in our calendar next year, in the hope that more

of our members might find it convenient to attend.

## SIR IVAN DOUGHERTY BIOGRAPHY PROJECT

Since the first report on this project in May W.O.G. a great deal of progress has been made. As was reported, Rod Humphries had agreed to produce the book with the proviso that he could not do any writing for at least eighteen months, and said that as much as he would like to undertake the job in memory of his father, he would not be offended if we found an author who could do the job more quickly. It was decided that for obvious reasons time was the essence of the contract. Mr. Tim Fearnside, a Journalist, Author and Publisher, should be approached, and Tim has kindly agreed to be our Author.

Tim is an original of the 2/13 Bn. who took part in all 9 Div. actions up to and including Alamein. On returning to Australia he went to No. 4 O.C.T.U. Woodside, and on being commissioned was posted to 2/3 Bn. and served with them until the end of the war. We are very fortunate to obtain the assistance of a person of Tim's calibre. Besides being a very experienced Infanteer he is a very successful Author, having produced five well received books including "Sojourn in Tobruk" and "Half to Remember".

At our last meeting on Monday, June 20th, we were honoured with a visit from Mr. Richard Smidt, who gave us some invaluable advice on methods of financing the project. Richard is a Solicitor who specialises in Company Law and is a close friend of the Pegg family, having been at University with John Pegg and served in the University Regiment with him.

One of the functions of the Committee of this project is to ensure that all material concerning the life and character of Sir Ivan is made available to his biographer. The 2/4 members on that Committee - and indeed all members of the Association - would be very remiss if any material relating to Sir Ivan's service with the 2/4 Bn. was ommitted through lack of effort. Specifically we require vignettes illustrating all facets of his character. His qualities as a soldier, his sense of humour and his popularity (a quality perhaps not at its zenith at the time of the Spitfire Fund), the "Spitfire Fund" itself and other incidents strictly relating to the 2/4th. If you were in daily contact with him, or even if he only spoke to you once, you must have an impression and all this a biographer needs to know. So this is it! There is no second go! NX4050 (N.S.MacI) and others - what about it?

HALF TO REMEMBER - By G.H. ("Tim") FEARNSIDE. (Published by Haldane Publishing Co. Pty Ltd. 154 Elizabeth Street, Sydney, Price \$7.95)

Both Harry GJEDSTED and Dick LATIMER have re cently reviewed this book - we offer you their remarks:
