HOW TO GET THERE

Take the Hume Highway through Liverpool to the cross-roads, then onto the Campbelltown Road, left fork at the Cross Roads.

Watch carefully for the Ingleburn turn-off to the right - about 1 mile from the Cross-Roads. This is fairly important, as the Campbelltown Road from this point becomes an Expressway.

Go almost through the Military Camp area (along the Campbelltown Road) to the BARDIA BARRACKS GATE on the right-hand side. Go through the gates and turn LEFT into Allen Road, along Allen Road and turn RIGHT into Kelly Road, go down Kelly Road and watch for the "White over Green" sign pointing to the Barbecue and Parking Area, which is adjacent to the Parade Ground.

If in doubt, ask the guard on duty at the Gate, but to make doubly sure of arriving without mis-hap, come along to the Gallipoli Club on Friday night, August 26th at 8 p.m. for Ladies Night and collect your map of the Ingleburn area, which will be available there for you.

Bring your own Portable Barbecue, food and liquid refreshments (there are no barbecue or mess facilities available on that day) and come along with your families and friends to ensure a happy, successful day.

"AUSTRALIAN COMMANDANT VISITS THE PRESIDENT.

On Friday 6th May, Brig.W.M.Gray M.B.E.,

L.C.M., AMM, Commandant Australian Command

and his ADC Lieut. Fredk. Kirkland, AMM, drove out to Hampton Court Palace and were met at the Trophy Gates by Major G.W.H.Woods, L.F., ADC to the President. Their visit had been cleared with Palace security beforehand and they were accorded VIP treatment to the Grace and Favour Apartments within the Palace.

"They were kindly received by General Sir Rodney Moore, GCVO, KCB, CBE, DSO, and Lady Moore in their charming apartments overlooking the Great Fountain Gardens, with its grand view of the famous Long Water stretching away through Hampton Court Park.

"General Moore and Brig. Gray found that they had served in the same sector in Malaya, where General Moore had been Director of Border Operations. Before they left, Brig. Gray presented General Moore with the Australian Medal of Merit.

"Major Woods, who until February had been PRO at the Palace, took them on a conducted tour of the State Apartments and Tudor kitchens This was followed by a pleasant drink in the historic Mitre Hotel nearby while another car was called up to take them out to Stoneleigh to lunch with the Commandant General." ## AUSTRALIAN FRONTIERSMEN VISIT TO BELGIUM -

#### May 7th to 10th, 1977.

A Group of Frontiersmen, consisting of Brig. GRAY, Major MacLENNAN, Major MORGAN and Lieut. KIRKLAND, visited Belgium in May as part of a group known as the Legion of Ancient Combatants of Belgium and Great Britain. We left Belgrave Square on Saturday morning, proceeding to Dover where we boarded the Cross-channel Ferry to Ostend, and were met by various Belgian Generals and ex-members of the Belgian war-time resistance movements before proceeding to Blankenberge - the headquarters for the week-end.

On Sunday we paraded and marched to the War Memorial, where Brig. Gray laid a wreath on behalf of the Commandant-General and the Legion throughout the Commonwealth. The salute was taken by the Burgomeister of Blankenberge, Brig. Gray, and Colonels Thurston and Strudwick of the U.K. contingent. Following an adress of welcome by the Burgomeister, the four members of the Australian contingent were presented with plaques bearing the Arms of Blankenberge. At a gala dinner in the evening at the Blankenberge Casino, Brig.Gray invested Mr. John Caes, Col. Thurston, Col.Strudwick and Major Woods with the Australian Medal of Merit. Mr. John Caes, who is the annual

organiser of the trip to Belgium is the son of Mama Caes, a great war-time resistance leader and fighter, who operated her resistance work from her restaurant in Blankenberge, right next door to the local "cop-shop" which was the Gestapo headquarters. Mama Caes was eventually "sprung" and as a result suffered torture by the lovable Gestapo. We of the Australian Command had the great honour and pleasure of meeting this outstanding old lady of 84 years, shaking her hand and kissing her on both cheeks in true Continental fashion. Mama Caes wears no less than sixteen medals and awards for bravery conferred on her by various Governments - a truly remarkable person - a great honour to meet, and certainly the highlight of our Belgian trip.

On the Monday the party paid an official visit to the city of Antwerp and were entert tained to a Civic Reception at the Town Hall. Tuesday was spent touring the historic city of Bruges, and in the evening, during a dance at Mama Caes's restaurant, two officers of the Royal Belgian Lancers arrived from West Germany where the Regiment is part of the NATO forces to present their Regiment's compliments to the Legion of Frontiersmen.

Whilst the above report on the visit to Belgium might not interest everybody, I hope it will be of interest to a number of members and would like to make an official call and an invitation to ex-members of the 2/4 Bn. who wish to join the Legion of Frontiersmen Gallipoli Squadron. I need various Officers and N.C.O.s but first and foremost I need 100 troops, because, as we are all aware, nothing functions without the troops - so whatever your rank was during the war do not let it concern you. If you refer to your March W.O.G. you will find good and solid reasons why you should join. Country and Interstate members are included in this call.
