#### THE BIOGRAPHY OF SIR IVAN DOUGHERTY

After some disappointment and some real tragedy we are pleased to announce that the manuscript is now in the hands of the Publisher, and it is confidently expected that the Biography will be available to you before Anzac Day, 1979.

We mentioned disappointment. We had hoped, no, expected is nearer the mark, a grant from the Federal Government to assist in producing such a worthwhile contribution to Literature, but unfortunately our expectations did not materialise.

Tragedy we have had a-plenty. The first person to offer to be Author — Major Paul Deschamps M.C. ex 2/13 (Aust. Inf. Bn. and G.S.O.2 to Field Marshall Sir William Slim (then commanding 14th Army Burma), passed away before he could commence the Biography.

After Paul's untimely death, one of his life-long friends, Lt. G.H. (Tim) Fearnside ex 2/13 and 2/3 Inf. Bns., undertook the authorship. Tim had completed 10 chapters when he suffered a heart attack an also passed away.

By this time, besides being sad beyond description, we were also afraid the biography we had planned for so long was a thing of the past.

Some people say miracles don't happen, but now we believe otherwise. When our prospects of completing the Sir Ivan Dougherty Biography project looked blackest, another life-long friend

of Paul Deschamp and Tim Fearnside, and an author in his own right, offered his services.

Lt. Ken Clift, D.C.M., ex 16 Inf. Bde.Sigs., 2/1 Inf. Bn and 1 Aust. Parachute Bn., undertook the herculean task of becoming co-author. You can imagine - or can you - the enormity of the task of taking over in mid stream and adapting your own style of writing to that of another author? Ken has done just that, and we feel - as we are sure you will - that this book is unique and a magnificent addition to our War Histories.

The things that make this Biography so different are firstly the calibre of the subject and the esteem in which he is held by all who have known him; secondly it is written about one of our greatest Infanteers by co-authors, both of whom were Infanteers with service records of which the majority of us can only be envious.

Gentlemen, the Biography is being edited by Col. A.W.Sheppard M.C. ex 2/4 Inf. Bn. and 6 Div. HQ, a very distinguished soldier and literary critic. We feel sure you will want to add this book to -----Dick Latimer. your library.

# A REPORT ON THE BIOGRAPHY BY THE COMMITTEE PRESIDENT

Since my last report we have had a number of meetings, and I now report progress to date.

1. Ken Clift has been working very hard tying up the loose ends,

arranging for photographs, a further 20 of which I had to get from the War Memorial in Canberra. Jack Huston organised these, and has been a great help with this Biography.

- 2. Col. Alex Sheppard M.C. has agreed to be the publisher of the book and has already had interviews with Ken Clift and attended a committee meeting.
- 3. We are very close to getting a title and feel that the one we come up with will be ideal and a pleasure to all.
- 4. You will be dismayed to learn that we did not get the \$1,000 grant from the War Memorial but we are going into the finance very carefully. We have discussed the price of the book and have had quotes from various printers, and can now state that it will sell at \$16.00 per copy, plus \$2.50 for postage. The book will be available for purchase and pick up from the Gallipoli Club, in which case the postage will not apply.
- 5. The book flaps have been written by Ken Clift who has done a wonderful job on these as well as the whole of the book since he has taken over.

There is nothing much else I can tell you at the moment, but feel sure you will all be more than pleased with the end result. Incidental I regret not arriving at Lismore and giving a full report on this Biography, but since have had a visit to hospital and hope now to be right.
