ANZAC DAY 1978

Once again the members of the 2/4 Battalion assembled on Anzac Day to pay homage to those who did not return and to be reunited with those with whom lasting friendships were forged nearly forty years ago.

The Battalion moved off promptly at 8 a.m. from York Street to the Cenotaph for the wreathlaying ceremony. Led by our Patron, Sir Ivan Dougherty and President, Harry Gjedsted the forty two 'early birds' on parade were joined by members of the original Fourth in Barrack St. for the traditional joint ceremony.

The main march was well attended. Led by the Parramatta Pipe Band (for the thirty second consecutive year) and the Banner Party (who for the first time preceded the Pipe Band). 102 members of the Battalion marched with all the verve of forty years ago. In the words of our principal guest, Major-General Gordon Maitland, at the Re-Union dinner

'The 2/4 Battalion had a wonderful war record and the record of this distinguished battalion is continued today, you only had to see the battalion on parade to-day to sense its traditions and pride. Very well done, 2/4th!'

The Re-Union Dinner, held at the Gallipoli Memorial Club was its usual resounding success. Attended by 145 members and their guests, both official and private many old friendships were renewed.

Some sort of record was created by Tich Fordham and Charlie Davies. Both were attending their first Anzac Day Re-Union. On the other hand another type of record - John Meehan attended his thirty-third consecutive Re-Union, having not missed a single one since being de-mobbed. The Loyal Toast was proposed by John Copland and Cec Chrystal proposed the toast to the 2/4th Battalion.

This was followed by a toast by our President to 'Our

Fallen and Departed Comrades'. During the traditional one minute's silence The Secretary, Athol Heath read the list of comrades departed during the last twelve months. They were:—

Our Patron, Sir Ivan, then invested our new Honorary Life Members, Ivan (Slim) POLLOCK, Athol HEATH and John MEEHAN with their badges.

President Harry then welcomed our Patron, Sir Ivan Dougherty.

In reply Sir Ivan pointed out that the continued strength of our association was mainly the result of the efforts of the officers of the association, both past and present committeemen. He concluded his address by saying:—
'In these days when we consider what is happening around us and become concerned about our security it is pleasing to have with us General Maitland who represents the Army of to-day. We are delighted to know that he is looking after the young soldiers of this country. It is because of the efforts that he has put in over the last years that we have some young soldiers, although perhaps not enough. We can only wish him success in his efforts to strengthen our Australian Army.'

Ted Fox very ably proposed the toast to our visitors. Our official Guests were Major-General Gordon Maitland, Order of Australia, OBE, ED., Inspector-General (Designate) of the Army Reserve; Major Terry Smith, 4th Battalion RNSWR; Capt. Peter Keating, President of the Association of 4th Infantry Battalions; WO1. Norm Harris, MBE, ED., ex 2/1st Bn. and 4th Battalion RNSWR; The Parramatta Pipe Band.

Major-General Maitland responded to the toast on behalf of all of the visitors. During his response he recounted an amusing anecdote concerning a chance meeting with a well-known Inverell identify - Selby Dean DCM., and the double coincidence of the number of his Staff Car - 2002 being Selby's NX number. General Maitland concluded his response by saying:

'I would like to tell all of you that the traditions that you have created are being carried on. The young soldiers of to-day, in the Battalions, are very fine people, I am proud of them, You would be proud of them, too.'

The raffle prize which was so generously donated by Ken Kesterven, was then drawn with great dexterity by Blah Smith. The winner of the garden setting was Dave McGilvray: the second prize was won by Ian Arnold (ticket sold by Sluggo Wyldeman).

The formalities being completed, fraternizing and conviviality were the order of the day. Space prohibits the recording of all of the activities of note that took place. However, some items of note were memory-catching — the two Smiths, Blah and Ross (Roaring H....) performing an impromptu Highland Fling to the Pipes and Drums of the Parramatta Band — Mick Gray recounting the daring deeds of Stuart Piniger when they served together in the Water Transport.
