This lone Pine is a seedling from a pine tree on Gallipoli and was planted by A H SECCOMBE DCM 4 Battalion AIF on April 25 1970. In memory of his mates lost at Gallipoli.

This is something that members should be aware of, and if any should visit Wagga, a trip to this spot is a must, not only to view the beauty of the Look—Out, but to see the Result of a thought from an old soldier of the 4th Battalion (from ex-Wagga-iteLaurie Waterhouse)
