SENIOR VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Although he had made considerable progress, President Bill MacLennan was still in hospital and so I deputised for him again at our meeting on 24th August, when twenty-three members were present, including three whom we have not seen often enough in recent years -Brian Waring, Bob Fergusson and Rex Everson. Captain Elvin Andrews was with us again and produced maps and aerial photographs of Wewak dating back to the time of our Campaign in that area. He pointed out that some of the native villages featured in those early maps are not now marked in current maps - they no longer exist. As the Battalion Intelligence Officer at that time I frequently doubted their existence then. Some of them were difficult to find 'on the ground', and I am sure that various of our Patrols shared my feelings.

Arguments 'for and against' acquiring a new Banner dis-playing our Battle Honours (as mentioned in the August journal) are being prepared for publication in 'W.O.G.' prior to next Anzac Day Reunion Meeting, when this matter will be decided. When we invited opinions per medium of an earlier 'W.O.G.', we received only one response. However, if any Member wishes to submit his views on the subject, they may be forwarded in writing to Athol Heath who will pass them on to the appropriate Committeeman.

To date we have received Raffle Entry Forms and cheques to a total of \$423.00. Not a very good response from a Membership of 500. You may not realise that it is currently costing us about \$3,000.00 per annum for the printing and posting of our monthly journal - our only means of communicating regularly with our Members and keeping everyone informed of what is happening within our Association. We do need to supplement our funds and preserve what we have. Come on, Chaps, out with the cheque books - right now, while you think of it.

Victoria Vice-President Claude Raymond and others have queried the ruling concerning the left breast position for wearing the Greek Commemorative Medallion. We understand that action is being taken by certain persons in authority to have this situation reviewed and firmly clarified - that is in respect of this particular Medallion, and in view of the circumstances surrounding its award to qualified Australian Ex-Servicemen. If and when your Committee receives further authentic information on the subject the nature of it will be published in 'W.O.G.' Meanwhile we must conform to the advice issued to us by 6 Div. Association, as stated in our August iournal.

'just a note to record the passing of one of our old mates in the person of Stanley E. Doggett, who passed away in Cootamundra on Aug. 12th and was buried there at on Aug. 14th.

'Stan was a very quiet solid man and for those who did not know, he came from a large family in Middlesex, England. He came out to Australia as a Barnardo Boy in the thirties and when war was declared in 1939, he was working in the Junee District. He was amongst the first batch of enlistments and was posted to A Company where he stayed until classified B Class in Darwin. After the war he returned to Junee area, married a local girl and bought himself a property at neighbouring Bethungra, which he ran until his death.

Sickness caught up with Stan in the last few months, and after a period in Concord he returned to Cootamundra Hospital where he spent his last few days. His funeral at Cootamundra was well attended, with quite a few Ex Servicemen in attendance, including five 2/4thers... Harold Conkey, Joe Wells, Wal Taylor, Matt Bristol and myself (Wem Keast). Harold Conkey read the R.S.L. service at the graveside.

'A reunion of the ex 2/4thers was, of course, held after the funeral.
