I suppose it was a toss-up as to which pass they came through. first, so a thought has been passed around that an interpretation of the plaque on the memorial erected by the people NSW, 2621 (Thank you Nell Steele for this information Ed.) of Xenon Neron should be financed by the whole of the 6th Div. The story goes that no sooner had the last German left Greece than these poor people erected this Memorial at Veve to 'Thosegallant Allies (us) who helped defend Greece in 1941'. Many tourists have seen this Memorial without knowing what it was, hence the idea of casting a plate with the interpretation'.
