RETURN TO GREECE AND CRETE 1980

It seems I am fated not to attend a Country Reunion having gone down with a bad bout of 'flu for the latest e. It was my intention at this reunion to give a brief uetail of my recent experience.

Phyl and I together with Jean Jackett (who is my sister) had intended going to London mid August for a month, however this changed dramatically when the plaque which had been ordered for Alex Sheppard to present to the Greek people of Vevi, had been very much delayed and it was not expected to be ready until the end of July or early August, by which time Alex would be back in Sydney. Hence the change of itinerary to give us two weeks in Greece and two weeks in London. This was able to be done and here is a very brief account.

We left Sydney on the 18th August by Qantas after having had discussions with Mrs. Diana Hutcherson. secretary to the Greek Consul in Sydney, who was most co-operative and handing me a letter of introduction to the Greek authorities in Athens. She had conveyed to them that I would be taking a plaque and gave them full details of our movements which they were very conversant with on our arrival.

Our first contact was with a Miss Coumanakou a most delightful young Greek lass who knew me by name as soon as I entered her office. (Her father by the way

served in the Air Force in the Desert, was a personal friend of General Tsetapadakis who recently visited Australia for the presentation of the Greek medal.) She, incidentally, is secretary to the Ambassador to whom she introduced us and suggested that we fly north as it was too hazardous and tiring a trip by car. I presented the Ambassador with a copy of 'Dougherty' which he was very pleased to receive.

We left Athens for Thessaloniki in the very early morning on Wednesday 27th August where we were met on arrival by Mr. 'Terry' Stamatopoulos and his driver. He was a young man very well educated and spoke perfect English, was the liason officer for the Department of Foreign Affairs in Northern Greece. He informed us we would be doing a three and a half hours' drive in a large Audi staff car, the driver being a professional and 'bo could he drive!' By the speedo the highest I saw it register was 155 ks. per hour, not a single thing passed us; he kept us informed of all towns and villages on the way. We had a delightful stop about half way at Edessa which was on the heights with a magnificent natural waterfall the intensity powering a hydro-electric power station.

On our arrival at Vevi (population of about 800 people) we were ushered into Mayor Frombis' office and offered a cool drink. Thence arrived singly his many councillors who came over and warmly shook my hand also Phyl's and Jean's - the Mayor of Amindaion

and several of his councillors then joined in. No one (except us and Terry) spoke English and I asked Terry if the Mayor would have a local area map which he produced and showed Hill 1001 which was where the fighting took place. This caused guite a bit of excitement and all talking together in Greek and pointing at me, it was rather embarrassing but I learnt many of them had been in the action there fighting on our left flank. At this stage I produced the plaque, presented it to the Mayor who gave it to one of his deputies to take out and place on the monument just outside and below the Council Chamber. The Prefect of Florina, Mr. Aspisidis in a large car flying the Greek flag on the front mudguard, arrived with Colonel Porfyris of the Border Station representing the Army and Colonel Dalambiras representing the Gendarmerie. The Prefect is head of all municipalities in Northern Greece, he was accompanied by his very attractive wife and two small sons.

Then came the priest with incense burning and bells ringing and he carried on his blessings of the plaque chanting the whole dedication and reminding us of the ceremony at the Cenotaph during the Cretan celebrations. I then laid a wreath followed by the Prefect and Mayor Rombis; I spoke a few words interpreted by Terry as many villagers had gathred and then Mr. Aspisidis gave a message (in Greek) which Terry also interpreted. Whilst we had previously been in the Mayor's office his deputies had placed the plaque in front of the Memorial with Greek and Australian flags and had also put up tiny Greek flags in festoons with a Greek shield at the top of the Memorial.

At the completion of the ceremony I made a request of Terry that I would dearly like to see the memorial at Xinon Neron (page 124 WOG) so with all speed, I with the Prefect, drove south to the memorial where Hill 1001 and the Monastir Pass were seen by me to bring back many memories. There were no changes or alterations in any of this area.

Following this with the time now about 2.45 p.m. the Prefect took us all to a magnificent Greek luncheon at a restaurant overlooking the whole of the Florina Valley and Colonel Porfyris invited us out to his Border Station for fruit and coffee – this was marvellous and we passed through the check point and saw the Yugoslav Border. Colonel Porfyris asked us to convey to General Dougherty his warmest regards. An Evzone Guard presented arms as we passed through to the Colonel's private mess. The Prefect presented Phyl with a Greek urn which was rather wonderful. Then said our byes and headed back at a rather fast rate to Thessaloniki airport just managing to catch the plane for Athens.

What a magnificent day, with VIP treatment these Greek people were so hospitable and repeatedly mentioned Australian soldiers with affection and seemed amazed that we should travel such a distance to present a plaque in memory of their Greek soldiers and their Australian brothers-in-arms. On 29th August we were up early and went by air to Heraklion arriving at our hotel just after 9 in the morning. On the way from the airport I saw both the 'Charlies', Apex Hill and the

Barracks. Everything in this area was much the same as when we had been there with the exception of a double highway running through and some factories at the rear of the 'Charlies'. Revisited the next day with a taxi driver who had been in the partisan force and knew the area very well.

Later on called in to the Town Hall but unfortunately missed the Mayor but spoke with his deputy who showed us the plaque which General Dougherty and Harry Gjedsted had taken across some years before. This has been framed and hangs proudly on the wall in the Mayor's office.

On Tuesday 2nd September we left this spot which had brought back so many memories and headed by airbus for London where we spent the next fortnight thence Home.
