6TH DIVISION REPORT 40 YEARS AFTER BARDIA

'Veterans of the 6th Division and their families will accend a Commemorative Church Parade at the Garrison Church, Millers Point on Sunday, January 4th, 1981 at 1030 hours on the 40th Anniversary of the assault of the Fortress of Bardia which was actually at dawn on January 3rd, 1941. Unit ties and medals to be worn.

'During the service, a plaque to the memory of the fallen will be unveiled by Major General Sir Ivan Dougherty.

It is hoped that Lady MacKAY, widow of the Commanding Officer of the Division at that time, Major General MacKay and Mrs. Allen, widow of the then, Brigadier 'Tubby' Allen will be able to attend along with Major General Ian Campbell and Sir Frederick Chilton both veterans of this famous Battle. Other State and Civic leaders are also invited as well as guests from other Divisions and arms of the Services.

Bardia was the first action of the newly formed 2nd AIF and the first by Australian land forces since 1918. Much depended on these sons of the Anzacs, they had a valiant tradition to uphold and it is to their credit that they were gloriously victorious and brought a much needed boost to the people of the British Empire, being the first land victory of the Second World War.

Those taking part should assemble at Sergeant Majors Row, which is the historic parade ground of the early Garrison troops. This is situated down Lower Fort Street, near Dowshire Place. Flags and banners will be in position from 1000 hours and the marchers will move off at 1015 hours.'

'Following the Church Parade, there will be a picnic at Garden Island, for all those who would like to see this historical and interesting spot. People are asked to bring you own hampers and refreshments although some will be available at the picnic. The harbour foreshores at Garden Island are quite picturesque and barbeque facil-

ities are available: it is anticipated that there will be an opportunity to have a look at a naval vessel and a tour of the more historical sites.

This is a unique sort of function which should attract a great number of people at no great cost to themselves or their organisations, see you there.
