I suppose he put the Desert Campaign first instead of worrying about a young private's haemorrhoids, they are all the same!

Fourty years later I was admitted to Gosford Private Hospital, for ex-privates only, although there was an ex-officer from 'A' Coy. in the Women's Ward. I could hear him singing under the shower.

When I am admitted to hospital I always get paraded before the Matron and ask for a particular ward, also the phone numbers of the nursing staff, if they are married and what their weight is. Never did like dancing with fat nurses. I always get admitted to 2/4 B, Room 2, Ward 4, bed B/b/coy. At last my hospital my luck ran out, was admitted to Ward 2/p.p. The dreadful Prostrate and Pensions Ward. There were all the familiar faces in the P.P. ward. No T.V., Prostrate Percy, Haemorrhoids Harry and worst of all, Pensions Percy. You meet Percy in every hospital, Perth, Brisbane, even in Wagga Wagga. He knows everything about pensions. I took his advice in Wauchope and fin-

ished up with a decrease which pleased Malcolm.

After recovering from this rare and complicated prostrate operation, again had no card from my Colonel (Can't remember his name!) Also no card from Cec Chrystal, my old 'B' Coy. O.C. He was too busy roaming around Vevi Pass and Northern Greece. He was lucky to get away from there in the first place. Like to see him on the football field, puffing and blowing, he was a good referee, did not need a whistle.

Spent a week in Northaven. George Sugden had to come down from Tamworth. Someone set fire to his cottages, burnt his cabin to the ground. George was busy cleaning up the mess, still giving orders. Glen Ackerman will be in Concord getting plastic knees. Harry Hamberger is poisoning the district and fish with his home brew.

Will have important news later since I heard Gordon Crisp is in the district. Must ask him do you take No. 9 pills before or after meals. Will need them when he arrives.

Snowy Moores will not be going to Prince Charlie's wedding. He fell down the stairs at the Masonic Club in Gorokan. Was only buying tobacco! Serves him right for smoking, he finished up in hospital.
