In conclusion may we say thank you to the boys at Wagga, to the members of the Association for their spontaneous re-action to Stan's predicament.

We only hope and pray that none of us ever have to go through such a trauma as Stan and Mrs. Blacksley have.

THE BANNERS

The Association was formed, I believe in 1943 by members who were discharged early on account of ill health, etc. and they met and founded the Association the main aim being to keep the comradeship going after the boys were discharged.

Sometime about 1943-44 they, in their wisdom decided to strike a banner for use on Anzac Day and other special functions. The first banner was in satin and of a triangular shape and depicted the 2/4th colour patch and bore the words, 'Libya', 'Greece', 'Crete', 'New Guinea'. On the top of course was '2/4th Infantry Battalion' This banner was used for years and carried with pride.

When the war ended, Mrs. Parkinson, the mother of the first boy killed in our unit wanted to donate a banner in memory of her son. This very pleasant lady attended each Anzac Day at our forming up place for many years and always had a good cheery word for the boys. The matter of the banner was debated at several committee meetings and on advice from Christies we chose Irish linen for its long term durability and standing up to all weathers. Now came our problem. Christies could supply the white and grey but not the bottle green. In desperation we contacted Fred Catley who was then living in England and somehow, he managed with the help of others to get the green for us.

The design of the banner was next onthe list. This was tossed around at quite a number of committee meetings. First we agreed to enlarge the size of the colour patch. Next problem was what we were going to design on it and after this was tossed around the committee (which changed hands a few times as it took us a few years to get the right green) we decided we would keep it as plain as possible. Hence the retired banner as it stands.

Before T.V. we were given a great mention on radio by the late Harry Watts and Eric Baume and this continued from Eric into the era of T.V. and the plainness of the banner was mentioned as the Silent Fourth. Last year we did not even get a mention, just a fleeting glimpse on T.V.

I voted against the changing of the banner but now can see things clearer. The new banner back to where we were in the very early days 'It's only an old bit of bunting.
It's only an old coloured rag
Yet thousands have died for it's honour
And shed their blood for the flag'
