ANZAC DAY 1982

There were fewer marchers to the wreath laying ceremony compared to last year. This could indicate that the day is becoming a bit too long for those of us who attend the wreath laying ceremony, the Commemoron March and teh re-union after. And for those who attend a Dawn Service, wherever it may be, it makes a

very long day indeed. The one hour plus in the interim of the wreath laying and the main march with its standing around is being felt by quite a few. And importantly, some who won't give in.
