PROGRAM OVERVIEW

It is open to any student in Valley Stream 24, and admittance is based on teacher or parent recommendation. A lunch is provided to all students in the program.

- Personalized Instruction: Small class sizes allow for personalized attention, ensuring that each student's unique learning needs are addressed. Teachers will use a variety of teaching methods to cater to different learning styles.
- Project-based learning: Students engage in project-based learning activities that integrate math and ELA skills into meaningful projects. These projects will encourage critical thinking, collaboration, and creativity, providing students with the opportunity to apply their knowledge in practical, real-world scenarios.
- Supportive Environment: The program aims to create a nurturing and supportive environment where students feel comfortable taking risks and making mistakes, which are essential parts of the learning process.
