THERAPY DOGS

 Some provide volunteer support and comfort to people when they do not have access to a dog

- Also known as comfort dogs
- Some work with professionals during therapy sessions
- Only allowed to go into places they are invited





SERVICE DOGS

- Specially trained to assist a person with daily living challenges
- Challenges can be visible or invisible
- Allowed into nearly all public spaces, except where food is made

EMOTIONAL SUPPORT ANIMALS

- Main role is to provide emotional support through companionship
- May be prescribed by some health care providers
- Have limited public access

COMPANION ANIMALS

- Also known as pets
- Only allowed in designated animalfriendly places (such as a restaurant patio, petfriendly hotel, or store)
