PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I Was Tricked!

It's true. That's how I joined the Fair Board. About 14 years ago, I was working for the person who ran Ag in the Classroom at the Fairgrounds. I watched while, over 5 years, he ran it, but not well. It could be done better. He said, "If you think you can do it better, you do it!" I said I would. As an aside, this should stand as a warning to anyone who criticizes a volunteer. By doing so, you're volunteering to do the job. I had done just that but I knew the risks when I opened my mouth. I didn't mind.

A couple of years into running Ag in the Classroom I was asked if I was "coming to the meeting tonight?". I asked "what meeting?" "The Fair board meeting". I said "I'm not on the Fair board". He asked "Do you run Ag in the Classroom?" I said "yes." "Then you're on the Fair Board". It turns out Ag in the Classroom was a Committee of the Fair all along. I had been tricked.

Thus began my ride down the slippery slope to caring too much and trying to make things better. Over the years of running Ag in the classroom I changed things. I wasn't ok with around 225 kids coming. Now we're hovering between 300 and 350 people attending. I was disappointed that the kids were bringing their lunches of pre-packaged food and soda to an event that was teaching them about food. I secured a sponsor and now the Fair Board makes the lunches with as much "real food" as we can manage while feeding over 300 people in under an hour.

I will always be proud of this meal. If you could see the wild eyed hunger on the faces of some of these kids who rarely see a meal that didn't come from a box or a restaurant, you'd be proud too. You would feel the disappointment I feel when they turn their noses up at our offering because they are, what we would call, picky. In reality, many of them have never been exposed to anything other than processed food, and so we double our efforts to bring them real food to their plate and an understanding of where it came from.

I went on to become a Director and tried to bring my urge to make things better to that job. Now I'm sitting in the big chair and I continue to try bring that to the Board. I try to challenge and encourage the other Board members and volunteers to do the same.

I hope you see and feel our efforts as you visit our Fair because in the 362 days from one Fair to the next, we work hard to make it better.

Was I tricked? Absolutely. Am I okay with that? Definitely, to the extent that I hope that someone tricks you into helping with a service club someday. You may be surprised at how enjoyable it is.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. A **Membership Fee** is \$10.00 and is good for one admission daily for the three days of the fair. This constitutes a yearly membership to the Forest Agricultural Society, which entitles the bearer of the Membership entry into the fair and a voice at monthly meetings. When a membership is purchased you will be providing a phone number in order to be contacted to help volunteer throughout the year (see a board member for committee listings).

Membership's can be purchased from the Secretary by attending the Annual General Meeting in January or one of the monthly meetings set for the 1st Thursday of each month from February until August.

Memberships will not be sold after August.

2. An **Exhibitor Fee** is \$7.00 and is good for one admission on one day only. This will allow the person so paying and any member of his family living under the same roof to compete in any or all departments, PROVIDED however, that if more than one member of the same family, even though living under the same roof, shall compete in any department or departments against one another, then each person so competing must pay the exhibitor fee as above required, and shall compete under his or her own name. (A \$7.00 fee will be retained for next year's exhibitor fee from each exhibitor winning \$15.00 or more in cash prizes).

Each exhibitor will be furnished with one admission ticket, which is good for one admission one day only. An exhibitor may enter as many exhibits as the rules of the class allow, with only one entry per section allowed in each class unless otherwise stated.

- 3. A *3-Day Pass* is \$25.00 and is good for one admission daily for the three days of the fair and is available in the office starting on the Wednesday of Fair weekend or at the front gate on the Friday night.
- 4. Each exhibitor, shall register to the Secretary, not later than 12 noon, Friday, September 20th, a list of entries intended for exhibition. Articles entered in Classes 21 to 65 may be brought into the exhibition building from 3:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 19th and from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon on Friday, September 20th, 2019. No articles will be accepted before 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 19th or after 12 noon, Friday September 20th. Livestock exhibitors' entries will be received up to 12 noon on Saturday, September 21st, and 10:00 a.m. Sunday, September 22nd, for Beef. Please Note that all entries must be listed in the order mentioned in the prize list. Additional entry forms may be obtained from the secretary. Send lists of entries in,

well ahead of time, to avoid waiting in line. Your entry tickets will be ready for you to pick up when you bring your exhibits in.

- 5. All articles for competition in the indoor departments to be in the showrooms before **12 noon on the first day of the exhibition** and properly located in their own department, and all stock and implements to be on the grounds by 11:00 a.m. on Saturday and 10:00 a.m. on Sunday.
- 6. All stock and articles must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor.
- 7. All exhibits in the Homecraft Section must be the work of the exhibitor. The judges are instructed to discard all soiled, defaced or old work and award prizes only to new and up-to-date work.
- 8. The judges will commence to work at 12 noon on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, unless otherwise stated.
- 9. Judges have full power to classify all exhibits. The judges are instructed to reduce the amount of premium or to withhold the prize if they consider the best entry in a class to be of inferior quality.
- 10. Any person or persons interfering with the judges in execution of their duties will be liable to expulsion from the grounds; and their prizes, should they receive any, will be withheld.
- 11. The decision of the judge or judges shall be final as to awarding prizes and no appeal shall be considered.
- 12. All parties awarded prizes are requested to take particular care of their entry tickets to avoid any error on the judges' books, and entries must be made for each article or animal. If you feel an error has been made on your prize money cheque, please notify the Secretary immediately.
- 13. Upon discovery of any fraud or deception as to ownership of any article exhibited or in any other manner, the Board of Directors shall withhold the payment of the prizes awarded.
- 14. No animal or articles exhibited shall be removed from the grounds or buildings before 4:30 p.m. Noncompliance with this rule will result in forfeiture of the prizes awarded to such animals. Indoor exhibits will remain until Sunday at 4:30 p.m.

Note:

All indoor exhibits will be left in the building until Sunday September 22nd. All articles to be picked up Sunday at 4:30 p.m.

- 15. The Directors of the Association agree to take every reasonable precaution to insure the safety of the animals and articles sent to the exhibition. It must be clearly understood that the owners are to assume all risks. Should any animal or exhibit be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will render all assistance in their power for the recovery of same, but they will not recognize any claim for payment of the value or portion thereof.
- 16. The Society reserves the right to pay the prizes on a percentage basis, if necessary, owing to decreased revenue from rain or other causes.
- 17. In case of a dispute, Class "A" Fair Rules are to govern.
- 18. The rules governing each market class of exhibits precedes the classes listed.
- 19. All livestock proof of age must be available.
- 20. There will be no entry fee for 4-H members showing 4-H calves in the calf classes. Membership will be retained.
- 21. Cash payouts will be available Sunday 12 to closing. Classes 21, through to 58.
- 22. Insurance Proof of Liability Insurance must be submitted with entry fee and forms. Must show company and policy number.

- B. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 324" measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition).
- C. The winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on a sign provided by O.A.A.S.
- D. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual O.A.A.S. Convention.
- E. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotion activities related to the competition.
- F. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention O.A.A.S. Competition.

LOCAL FAIR COMPETITIONS

1. Each local fair is entitled to send only the GRAND CHAM-PION QUILT, (min. 324" measured on the perimeter) judged the Best of Show of all eligible hand quilted quilts to the District Competition.

OR

If any entry wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of ALL ELIGIBLE QUILTS at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST of SHOW of ALL CLASSES quilt in the District Competition.

NOTE: If an exhibitor wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts at other than his/her own Fair, or at more than one Fair, the exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.

2. An exhibitor who wins more than one BEST of SHOW title with a different quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.

3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts. As well as RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION or SECOND BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts. The GRAND CHAMPION and the RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE quilts.

DISTRICT COMPETITIONS

- 1. Judging at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each O.A.A.S District.
- 2. The 1st place winning hand quilted quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the OAAS Championship Quilt Competition at their Annual Convention. In cases where the winner of the District first prize quilt decides not to enter the Final Championship Competition, the Second Prize quilt winner at the District Competition will be eligible.
- 3. The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies will award a ribbon and each district will award prize money of \$25 for 1st place, \$15 for 2nd place, and \$10 for 3rd place, to exhibitors of winning hand quilted quilts at each District Competition.
- 4. District results must be registered on the O.A.A.S. Championship Quilt Entry Form, returned to O.A.A.S. c/o Office Manager by December 1.

PROVINCIAL COMPETITION

- 1. Judges who officiate the Championship Quilt Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the O.A.A.S.
- 2. All quilts entered in the competition must be hand quilted.
- 3. All quilt entries must be received for judging by the Competition Coordinator in the designated room between 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. on Friday of the Annual Convention of the O.A.A.S.
- 4. Competition Coordinator will assign a number for each entry. Entries will only be identified by this number during the judging process.
- No Exhibitor shall be permitted to place or attach any Fair or other Exhibition identification on their quilt entry. Please remove all tags, ribbons, etc.
- 6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the quilt judging and winner has been announced.
- 7. Any Exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the Exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who

- interferes with the judges or the judging process, shall be disqualified and the quilt will be removed from the competition.
- 8. No quilt exhibit shall be removed from the display viewing area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
- 9. The O.A.A.S. shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident, condition of quilt, the negligence of other Exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
- 10. Any protests must be made to the Homecraft Committee of the O.A.A.S. in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the Convention.
- 11. The entry judged BEST OF SHOW at the February Convention will be declared the O.A.A.S. CHAMPIONSHIP OUILT.

A \$500 GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt. A certificate and ribbon will be awarded to the winner. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

O.A.A.S. ANNUAL MACHINE QUILTED QUILT COMPETITION

Eligibility, Rules and Regulations

GENERAL CONDITIONS

- A. Entries must be solely made and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (O.A.A.S.) Fair to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Quilt to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches Note the article can be square, rectangular, etc.
- C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt will be selected at the Annual O.A.A.S. Convention.
- D. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Machine Quilting Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- E. The winning O.A.A.S. Machine Quilted quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or O.A.A.S. Provincial Competition.

- F. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
- G. Quilt must have visible machine quilting.

LOCAL FAIR COMPETITIONS

1. Each local fair is entitled to send only one Grand Champion Machine-Quilted Quilt, judged Best of Show of all eligible machine quilted quilt to the District Competition.

OR

If any entry wins *Grand Champion* or *Best of Show* of all eligible *Machine-Quilted Quilts* at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this item was entered and won, should enter their *Reserve Champion* or *Second Best of Show* of eligible Machine-Quilted Quilts in the District Competition.

NOTE: If an exhibitor wins *Grand Champion* or *Best of Show* of all eligible *Machine-Quilted classes* at other than his/her own Fair, or at more than one Fair, the exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District Competition.

- 2. An exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different machine-quilted quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.
- 3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a *Grand Champion* or *Best of Show* of all eligible Machine-Quilted quilts as well as a *Reserve Champion* or *Second Best of Show* of eligible Machine-Quilted quilts.

The *Grand Champion* and the *Reserve Grand Champion* are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE machine-quilted quilts.

DISTRICT COMPETITIONS

- 1. Judging at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each O.A.A.S. District.
- 2. The 1st place winning machine-quilted quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the O.A.A.S. Championship Machine-Quilting Competition at the Annual Convention. In cases where the winner of the District first place prize machine-quilted quilt decides not to enter the Final Championship Competition, the Second Prize machine-quilted quilt winner at the District Competition will be eligible.
- 3. The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies will award a ribbon and the District will award prize money of \$25 for first place, \$15 for second place, and \$10 for third

place to exhibitors of winning machine-quilted quilts at each District Convention.

4. All District entries must be registered on the O.A.A.S. Championship Machine Quilting Entry Form, returned to O.A.A.S. Office Manager, by December 1.

PROVINCIAL COMPETITION

- 1. Judges who officiate the Championship Machine Quilting Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the O.A.A.S.


